**Tomato Soup.**—Use one pt. can of tomatoes. Strain, place on fire in a little cold water, mix smooth with a tablespoon cornstarch, add to tomatoes, and stir till it thickens. Then add 2 tablespoons butter, one dash of cayenne and some pepper. Serve hot with oysters.

**Baked Croquettes.**—One pint of milk, 1 cup rich milk or cream, 1 egg, one tablespoon each of bechamel, butter, half teaspoon flour. Scald the cream or milk and butter together, then stir in hot cream, then add chicken and seasoning. Boil two minutes, then add bread crumbs and beaten eggs. Set to broil.

**Deviled Eggs.**—Boil two eggs.

**Select small ones, or if large, cut into uniform size.**

**Place into bottom of turkey pan and brown slow.**

**Shave cabbage very fine.**

**Serve hot.**

**Garnish alternately with sprigs of parsley and lemon.**

**Christmas Pudding.**—One pound of suet, two lbs. each of currants and raisins, one lb. brown sugar, one lb. each of candied peel (orange, citron), chopped fine, one qt. milk, one teaspoonful of baking powder, one tea-spoon salt, 2 lbs. flour. Rub raisins and currants well with flour, then sink to the bottom, cover from top to bottom with suet, add two hours and a half. This is an expensive stuffing, but one wants to have the best on Christmas day.

**Stewed Apples on Surprise.**—Core and cut in eights eight apples, put in sugar with one-half cup maple syrup, one cup sweet cider, two slices cut from a lemon, one-quarter teaspoon salt, one tablespoon butter and a few gratings of nutmeg; then cook until soft. Cool, and fill shells made by taking a thick slice from stem end of bright red apples, and scraping out inside. Cover with melted suet of whites of two eggs beaten with two tablespoons powdered sugar, and one teaspoon lemon juice. Place under gas flame of gas range to brown margarine.

**Muscatine Sausage.**—Melt three tablespoons butter, add a few drops orange juice, and cook until slightly browned; then add three and one-half tablespoons flour, one cup cream water drained from cooking one-half pound mushrooms, stems with heads cut off to make one-half cup. Season with salt, and two eggs, and one tablespoon meat extract. Add mushroom caps, cut and sautéed in butter, five minutes, then add enough to make a half cup. Create purée lightly and add to sausages with flour. Drop batter and spread out thinly on waxed paper. Cook in moderate oven, about 350° F., for half an hour, turn, and double over wafers quickly and let stand all day, watching continually that they do not burn. Serve with mustard.
