The Council met December 16th, as per statute. Members present: Thos. McFadden, Reeve, Messrs. Davis, Kerney and Arrowsmith.

Davis-Kerney.—That cheques issue in favour of the several Boards of School Trustees for the accounts of General and Section rates amounting in the aggregate to the sum of \$4420.95.—Carried.

Davis-Arrowsmith.—That D. McFayten be paid \$1.50, for work at lots 40 and 50, con 3, E. G. R. (special).—Carried.

Davis-Arrowsmith.—That Joseph Atkinson be paid \$1.75, for work at lot 19.—Carried.

Davis-Kerney.—That the report of the Local Board of Health be adopted, and that the members thereof be paid a further sum of \$3.00 each.—Carried.

Kerney-Arrowsmith.—That George Roy and Henry Clayburn be paid \$12.00 each, for charity for the six months ending 31st December, and that James McGilvray be paid \$12.00, for keep of Mary McArthur up to Dec. 31, and that Thos. Dunn be paid \$10 for keep of Mrs. Furneaux for July and August.—Carried.

Kerney-Arrowsmith.—That A. Black be paid \$4.00, for repair of culvert at lot 48, con 3, N. D. R.—Carried.

Arrowsmith-Davis.—That the Municipal World be paid \$7.75, for Municipal Forms for elections.—Carried.

Arrowsmith-Kerney.—That Frank Hale, be paid \$4.00, for work at lot 20, con. 8 (Statute Labor Fund).—Carried.

Davis-Kerney.—That John McGrath be paid \$3.25 for dry work for Hall, and that Joseph Neil be paid \$1.75, for cedar for same.—Carried.

Arrowsmith-Kerney.—That Commissioner for Ward 2 be paid balance of his commission amounting to \$6.72.—Carried.

By-law No. 435, appointing polling places and deputy returning officers was passed.

Davis-Kerney.—That the clerk be paid \$5.00, balance of salary, \$10 for preparing minutes for publication, \$2.18 for Postage and Express Charges.—Carried.

Kerney-Arrowsmith.—That the Treasurer be paid \$1.90, for bank draft and postage, Wm. Kerney, \$3, for committee work, The Reeve and Mr. Davis \$1.00 each, for committee work and Archie McLean \$1.40, for gravel.—Carried.

The Reeve having left the chair, the same was taken by Mr. Davis, when it was moved by Mr. Kerney, seconded by Mr. Arrowsmith.

That the thanks of this council in due and are hereby tendered to Mr. Thomas McFadden, Reeve, for the kind, intelligent and gentlemanly manner in which he presided over the deliberations of this Council during the year that is now drawing to a close, as we have found in him, always a ready and willing assistant in both work and advice, for the welfare of the township. Minnie's Camp

Our camp was taken by surprise on Thursday, the 3rd day of December, by the Fisherton police force, and Mr. D. McIntosh, of Shelburne, was arrested on a charge of horse-stealing near Fisherton.

The officers at Fisherton must think our camp contained a gang of rough characters by the number of men they sent up to arrest one innocent young man. Two suspicious looking characters were seen loafing around the bush that afternoon, and that night about a dozen men were stationed around the camp, every door being guarded while constable Whitten made the arrest.

A trial was held in Fisherton on the following Friday and McIntosh went up to Owen Sound to stand his trial, which should have come off last week, but for some reason it was postponed until next March, and McIntosh is out on \$1000 bail. Ten thousand dollars was offered for his bail from around his home, which speaks well for his character. The boys at the camp held a reception and oyster supper last Friday night for McIntosh who was a great favorite among the boys.

By-Law No 85

To prohibit the sale of Liquor in the Township of Euphrasia.

The Municipal Council of the Township of Euphrasia hereby enact as follows: FIRST: That the sale by retail of spirituous, fermented, or other manufactured liquors, is and shall be prohibited in every tavern, inn, or other house or place of public entertainment...

SECOND: That the vote of the electors of the said Township of Euphrasia shall be taken in the By-Law by the deputy returning officers hereinafter named, on the fourth day of January, one thousand nine hundred and four, and commencing at the hour of nine o'clock in the morning and continuing until five o'clock in the afternoon; at the time and place of polling places:

Polling sub-division No. 1, the poll shall be taken in the school house of Union School Section No. 1, Euphrasia and Collingwood, W. C. Kerr, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 2, the poll shall be taken in a house owned by George Booth on lot 24 of the first concession, Township of Euphrasia, James A. Dales, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 3, the poll shall be taken in the school house of School Section No. 3, Simon Robinson, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 4, the poll shall be taken in the public hall, Kimberley, Thomas Abercrombie, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 5, the poll shall be taken in the township hall of the said township, John J. Cook, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 6, the poll shall be taken in the school house of School Section No. 14, Charles Fothergill, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 7, the poll shall be taken in the school house of school section No. 16, Edward Brady, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 8, the poll shall be taken in the school house of School Section No. 9, Alexander Abercrombie, Deputy Returning Officer.

Polling sub-division No. 9, the poll shall be taken in the driver's wagon house at Wodehouse, David R. Ellis, Deputy Returning Officer.

THIRD: That on Saturday, the twenty-sixth day of December, A.D. 1903, the Reeve will attend at the Township Hall at the hour of four o'clock in the afternoon, and a small number of writing, signed by himself and persons to attend at the final summing up of the votes by the clerk, and one person to attend at each polling place on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of preventing the passing of this By-Law, and a like number on behalf of the persons interested in and desirous of opposing the passing of this By-Law.

FOURTH: That the clerk of the said Municipal Council of the Township of Euphrasia, shall attend at his office at the hour of two o'clock in the afternoon on the sixth day of January, A.D. 1904, to sum up the number of votes given for and against this By-Law.

FIFTH: This By-Law shall come into operation and be of full force and effect on and after the first day of May next after the final passing thereof.

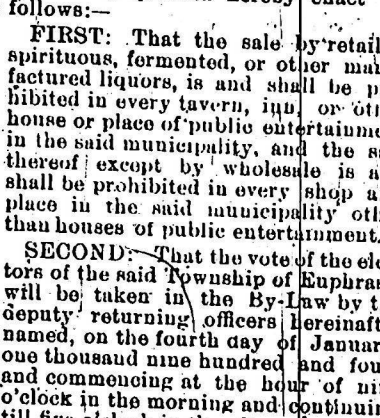
