Council met January 11th as per  
statute. Present—Thomas McFadden,  
Reeve; Thos. Davis, Geo. E. Arrow-  
smith, Wm. L. Kerney and John A.  
McMillan. Councilors. Each member  
made and subscribed the declaration  
of qualification and of office, and took  
their seats. The reeve in the chair,  
minutes of last meeting read and con-  
firmed. The following communications  
were read: From Miss M. E. Hunter,  
balance of account for the year 1903;  
from Wm. W. Wise, account for printing;  
from the collector, verified statements  
re collectors' rolls; from J. Ross  
Robertson, praying for assistance for  
Sick Children's Hospital; from C. W.  
Rutledge, account for advertising;  
from John McDonald application for  
office of Assessor.

By-laws Nos. 436, auditors, 437,  
Board of Health, 438, Assessor was  
introduced and read a first and second  
time.

Kerney-Davis-That Jas. McLaughlan  
be paid the sum of \$25 for burial  
and funeral expense of Elizabeth  
Wise; and that R. Carruthers be paid  
\$1.76 for telegrams re Miss Wise.—  
Carried.

Kerney-Arrowsmith-That cheque  
be issued on the Treasurer for \$9.00,  
balance due the General and Marine  
Hospital at Owen Sound, in full for seep  
Miss Wise, to the time of her death.—  
Carried.

Arrowsmith-Davis-That Wm. Irwin  
of the Durham Chronicle be paid the  
sum of \$19.25 for printing.—Carried.

Arrowsmith-McMillan-That the  
Reeve and Mr. Davis be a committee  
to enquire into the sufficiency of the  
report given by the Treasurer and  
report at next meeting of council.—  
Carried.

Davis-McMillan-That By-law No.  
436 to appoint auditors be filled in  
with the names of R. T. Edwards and  
John McMillan, at a salary of \$8.00  
each, and that said By-law be then read  
a third time, signed, sealed and en-  
grossed on By-law Book.—Carried.

McMillan-Davis-That By-law No.  
437, to appoint members of the Local  
Board of Health be filled up with the  
names of Thos. Nichol as member, and  
J. G. Hutton, M.D., as Medical Health  
Officer, and that said By-law be then  
read a third time, signed, sealed and  
engrossed on By-law Book.—Carried.

Davis-Kerney-That By-law No.  
438 to appoint an assessor for the  
Township of Glenelg for the year 1904,  
be left over to be considered at next  
meeting of the council.—Carried.

McMillan-Kerney-That the clerk  
be instructed to advertise for applica-  
tions for the office of assessor for the  
Township of Glenelg for the year 1904,  
no applicants to state salary.—Carried.

Davis-McMillan-That the clerk be  
instructed to ask for tenders for the  
township printing for the year 1904.—  
Carried.

Arrowsmith-Kerney-That Commis-  
sioners for the several wards be as  
follows: Ward 1, T. Davis; Ward 2,  
J. A. McMillan; Ward 3, G. E. Arrow-  
smith; Ward 4, Wm. T. Kerney; and  
that the reeve have supervision over  
the whole township.—Carried.

Davis-McMillan-That the Treas-  
urer be instructed to pay to the admin-  
istrator of the estate of Archibald  
McNab \$2.40 for gravel used on roads  
in 1903.—Carried.

The council adjourned to Feb. 6th at
