### ASSIZE COURT CASE.

The following case which was recently tried in Owen Sound has become of more than local interest because of the repeated efforts which have been made to evade paying the insurance, Dillon v. Mutual Reserve. This case opened on Tuesday morning and engaged the attention of the court for about two days and a half, a verdict being found on Thursday. The plaintiff is the widow of John Dillon, late of the township of Euphrasia, who died about two years and a half ago. He was insured in the Provincial Provident Institution, whose business was taken over by the defendants, The Mutual Reserve Fund Life Association of New York city. Mrs. Dillon fully filled proofs of claim, but her claim was not recognized, the company stating that her husband when applying for the insurance had made certain misrepresentations and claiming that if the true facts had been disclosed at the time the insurance was applied for that no policy would have been granted by the company. The evidence was very lengthy, and included evidence taken on commission in Ireland as to the age of the late Mr. Dillon. It also included the evidence of the late Dr. McLean, of Meaford, taken at the last trial hold two years ago. A considerable portion of the evidence was of an expert medical character, a number of physicians from Owen Sound, Markdale and Toronto being present and testifying.
