ARTEMESIA COUNCIL.

The Artemesia council met in the hall on Saturday last. The members were all present, the reeve in the chair. The minutes of session of February 6, 1904, were read and confirmed. The following communications were presented and read:

The clerk of Nelson township, asking council to join in a petition to the Legislative Assembly, asking that the term of municipal councilors be extended to two years; M. F. Ainslie, secretary of local municipalities of county of Oxford, asking council to join in a petition favoring optional legislation re formation of county council; tenders for purchase of timber on Alma street, Eugeneia, from P. Munshaw, James Williams and J. E. Williams; J. I. Graham applied to be overseer on valley road; the reeve and clerk, reporting on closing part of Alma street, Eugeneia, and disposing of the same to Eugeneia Electric Light and Power Company, recommending that the same be done on certain conditions.

Bylaw 633, appointing officers for 1904, was read a first and second time. Bylaw 634, authorizing the borrowing of \$1000 for current liabilities, was passed.

Meade—Best—That R. G. Waring be refunded \$36., being an error in his taxes 1903, lots 1 and 2, con. 2, N. D. R.—Carried.

Purvis—Best—That this council take no action in sale of timber on Alma street, Eugeneia.—Carried.

Gibson—Meade—That the reeve and Mr. Best be a committee to examine part of 180 sideroad from back line to Richard Allan's land, with a view of assisting Mr. Allan to open the same or disposing of it.—Carried.

Purvis—Gibson—That notices be placed on valley road, that the same is only under construction and persons travelling on same do so at their own risk.—Carried.

Gibson—Meade—That any person or persons cutting or removing timber from any streets in the town plot of Eugeneia, or any roads of this township shall be prosecuted according to law.—Carried.

Gibson—Meade—That the draft petition presented to this council regarding the formation of county councils to consist of the reeves and mayors of the municipalities, be adopted, and that the reeve and clerk sign the same and forward the same to I. B. Lucas, Esq., M.P.P., to be presented to the Legislature.—Carried.

Best—Purvis—That the council concur in the petition of the township of Nelson, making the term of councils two years, and that the council sign the same and forward it to I. B. Lucas, Esq., M.P.P., to be presented to the Legislature.—Carried.

Gibson—Meade—That this council hereby appropriate the sum of \$600 for repairs to roads for 1904 as follows: Div. 1, \$150; div. 2, \$150; div. 3, \$150; div. 4, \$150; and the members of this council are appointed commissioners to expend the same in their several several divisions, and that they be allowed ten per cent of said amount for expending the same. Should any commissioner expend more than his appropriation without the consent of this council, the amount shall be deducted from his commission, and that a statement of such expenditure be presented to this council before any commission is paid, this appropriation not to include town lines or bridges costing more than ten dollars.—Carried.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE.

To the council of the Township of Artemesia.
GENTLEMEN—Your committee appointed at your last session to enquire into and report upon the closing of part of Alma street in the village of Eugeneia, upon which the falls are situated, beg to report as follows:
Your committee, after considerable thought and enquiry, have concluded that it would be advisable to close up said street from the northerly limit of Simpson Street to the southerly limit of Bosquet street or so much thereof as would be required with this street, and convey the same to the Eugeneia Electric Light and Power Company, upon conditions as hereinafter set out:
1. That the said company shall enter into an agreement with your honorable body covering the following: To supply the inhabitants of your township with electric power for lighting purposes at a rate of not more than 25 cents per month per six-tube candle power, and at the same rate for greater or less candle power lamps, all night service, and that the said company shall have the right to lay the electric light and power Company, and to erect for your year per 32 candle power, 2. That for power purposes the inhabitants of your municipality shall have the right of use, and at a reduction of not less than 10 per cent less than shall be supplied to outsiders.
3. That the said company shall commence the completion of said power within one year from the time the said street is closed, and shall have the said street in operation and in full operation within two years from said time, and in case the said company do not have the said street in full operation within the said time, the said street shall revert back to the said municipality, as if the same had never been sold or leased to the said company.
4. As to the price over and above the price which shall fix the price to be asked therefor, which may be arranged between your honorable body and the said company.
5. We would recommend your honorable body to grant the said company the right to erect poles and wires upon the right of way, and to require for their purposes, but to be subject to such conditions as the council may think necessary in the case.
6. We also beg to suggest that a clause be placed in said agreement in the case of the incorporation of any of the villages now in the township into any future (ing such village) with the said company, that the said company shall be made by your honorable body with the said company in regard to the use of said power.
7. We further beg to suggest that your honorable body be legally advised in any action taken by you in regard to this matter.
All of which is respectfully submitted.

NECK BROKEN BY ELEVATOR.

Employee in Hanover Factory Meets A Terrible Fate.
An accident happened at Hanover on Tuesday of last week in the Kuechel Furniture Company's factory, causing the death of Adam Hanert, one of the company's oldest employees. Some of the bolts in the gearing of one of the elevators became loose and Hanert, who usually attended to all repairing in the factory, tightened them. This being done, the elevator was started down the shaft, but caught in a projecting rod and stopped. When the elevator stopped the machinery went on and unspooled the cable which held it. Mr. Hanert then went in under to see what was wrong, and catching hold of the swinging cable, gave it a jerk. In doing so the elevator was released and commenced to fall. Seeing his danger, Hanert tried to get from under, but was too late, the elevator striking him and breaking his neck. He leaves a widow and six young children.

\$100,000 Blaze At Collingwood.

Fire started in the large three story block of stores and warehouses owned and occupied by the T. Long and Bro. Co. on the west side of Hurontario street, Collingwood, on Tuesday morning last, and it was not long before the building was in flames, and all hopes of saving it abandoned.

The firemen and citizens worked hard but they could do practically little, except keep the fire from the adjoining property, which they were successful in doing.

The stock and buildings were a total loss. The firm had been in business there for forty years and moved to their premises 22 years ago. At that time, 1881, they like the other business men of Collingwood were entirely burned out by the fire of that year.

The firm carried an immense stock of dry goods, boots and shoes, clothing, millinery, groceries and crockery, and were the oldest business firm in this part of Canada. The total loss on building and stock will touch \$100,000, and is said to be only partly insured. No reason can be given for the starting of the fire.
