(Daily News, Vancouver, B. C.) With a bullet wound in the back of is head, and another right through his chest, John Spittal was found in bis shack, two or three miles beyond Eburne, on the Steveston Road. The unfortunate man appears to have been shot while outside, and the body was dragged in and the door of the shack locked on the outside. Spittal Chicago, speaks to young women. had been missing for about a month, and when one of his neighbors started an investigation, the gruesome discovery was made. One bullet had entered behind the ear, going through the head, while another had pierced the chest.

John Spittal was a man of about 50. years of age, and for some years had been a familiar figure in the Lower Fraser district. He had worked at different ranches and farms in that neighborhood, and up to last fall had an interest in a threshing outfit. He had also worked as engineer at one of the canneries, and had a good reputation as a respectable man.

their business to themselves. Spittal was a Scott. He had been in Canada for some years. He did not come here direct from Scotland, but worked on a farm near Markdale. Ont.

After discussing the economic and representative merits of the present composition of County Councils, the following resolution was passed unanimously:
Davis-McMillau-That this council

approve of the Municipal Amendment Act of 1903, Section 68, and that this council do hereby as a local municipality decide that we would be better represented at the county council by the reeve of this municipality for the time being, and the clerk is hereby instructed to send a certified copy of this resolution to the clerk of the County of Grey prior to October 1st .--Carried unanimously.

A petition was signed and ordered to be forwarded to Pr. Jamieson, M.P.P., for presentation to the Legislature at its present session, praying that no interference shall be made of the optional section of the Municipal Amendment Act of 1903.

The council adjourned to April 16th at 10 a.m. J. S. Black, Clerk. Note. - During the last seven years under the old system of County Councils, the county Rate for Glenelg totalled \$9694.42, or an average of \$1384.91.

During the seven years of the present system the County Rate for Glenelg totalled \$101:9.39, or an average of \$1445.62. The railway debentures being an uncontrolable debt is not taken into account. Economy did not. come this way.
