SUCCESSFUL CLOSE OF THE EVANGELISTIC CAMPAIGN.

A Rare Treat.—Hundreds Commence a New Life.—A Moral, Intellectual and Spiritual Up-lift.—An Impressive and Affecting Close.

The people of Markdale and vicinity have during the last three weeks been favored and blessed by the presence and labors of the "Canadian Evangelists," Revs. Crossley and Hunter. A word about these men. They are "men of God" and their labors are being abundantly owned by Him. They are men of genuine excellence—men of industry, of integrity, of high principle, of sterling honesty of purpose—and as such command the spontaneous homage of their hearers. It is natural to believe in them, and to imitate them. All that is good in the world is upheld by them, and what is evil is condemned, and that with no uncertain sound. They are great men, strong men. They have great gifts, and they do not abuse them. Each acts his part honestly and honorably and to the best of his ability. They strive to make the best of life. They are true, just, honest and faithful, even in small things. In a word they do their duty in that sphere to which Providence has called them. Their addresses are wonderful to hear. Apart from the religious element the meetings are an intellectual treat. To hear Mr. Hunter give his comment on the lesson, and to listen to Mr. Crossley's sweet singing is a treat. It is needless to say that in all the meetings, though wrongdoing has been banished without gloves, nothing unkind or uncharitable has been said or done. This is as it should be, and is such as one would expect from these men.

Immense throngs have been charmed and blessed at every service; the Methodist church, the largest auditorium in the village, being taxed to its utmost at each meeting. Reference has been made in these columns to the services up to Sunday last. On that day five sessions were held. In the morning Rev. Hunter, evangelist, conducted a reception service in the Presbyterian Church, while Rev. Crossley held a similar meeting in the Methodist Church. Both services were seasons of power and blessing. Some fifty joined the Presbyterian Church and the membership of the Methodist Church was increased by eighty-nine. In either case the candidates for membership were many of our leading citizens and business men. A great number of young men presented themselves, and it was cheering to see so many children identifying themselves with the Church of their choice.

In the afternoon Mr. Hunter addressed the ladies on the subject of the "Model Woman." It is needless to say that the address was a characteristic one, as the theme is one upon which the speaker is quite at home. The ladies were given many practical hints as to their great work and responsibility in society, in the church, and lastly and more especially in the home—the woman's kingdom. At the same hour Mr. Crossley lectured to the men in the Methodist church. His subject was "Mysteries." The speaker appeared at his best, and tore to ribbons the theories of the agnostic, the infidel and the atheist. Infidelity received many hard knocks, body blows, in the logical, incisive and scholarly address. Many remarked that the address was the most masterful effort on the subject they had ever heard.

In the evening the great union service was held. How so many were able to get into the Methodist church will ever remain a mystery. The service was cheerful, helpful and soul-stirring. Mr. Hunter's message was invigorating, while Mr. Crossley never sang better. At the inquiry-meeting scores made public confession intimate their resolve to lead a new life.

On Monday night the Dance, or the "Dawnee" as Mr. Hunter called it, was discussed. The excuses for holding dances were taken up and thoroughly disposed of; the evils resulting from the dance were shown and warnings given. The address seemed to affect the large audience wonderfully, and

Crowd Stopped the Game.

The Markdale vs. Durham Lacrosse Match Interfered With by Spectators and Game Remains Unfinished.

The Durham lacrosse club and the Aberdeens of Markdale made their first break into championship lacrosse this week. On Tuesday the Markdale team went over to Durham to open the season. The game, while it lasted, was about as fair a sample of lacrosse as ever gladdened the eye of a spectator, but unfortunately it was not of long duration. It was about a quarter past four that the players lined up on the green before a crowd of five hundred people. Mrs. (Dr.) Jamieson placed the ball between the sticks of the opposing centre players expressing that if it were possible she wished both teams success. Then referee George Allen, of Mount Forest, called play, and the game was on. At the face-off Markdale scored the ball and with two or three quick passes it was down on the Durham flags, where it was blocked and sent back up the field again, when it was again stopped; thanks to Markdale's strong defence. The first quarter was marked by speedy combination and many brilliant plays. During this quarter Durham scored one goal—the only one scored during the game, which by the way, is no more than could be expected, as two of Markdale's best defence men were off for minor offences at the time.

The second quarter found Markdale on the aggressive and the ball dangerously near the Durham nets. About ten minutes of this quarter had been played when a bad mix-up occurred. Two or three players were having a little scrap, which would probably have amounted to much had not some of the spectators rushed on the field. The Markdale boys were used pretty roughly, and refused to line up again, and referee Allen, declared the game unfinished, owing to the interference of the spectators.

The matter will be submitted to the council of the O.L.A., and it is likely the game will be ordered to be played over again.

The management of the Durham team greatly regret the occurrence, and are likely to prosecute the spectators that interfered, so as to prevent any further trouble. We might also say here that the Markdale team have no ill-feeling toward the Durham players, and when they play in Markdale several policemen will be employed to keep the crowd back.

A free-will offering is taken at each service. This is counted by two treasurers appointed by the committee of management, and banked. Out of this fund all legitimate expenses are paid by cheque, such as board and lodging, literature which is distributed gratuitously during the services, extras for janitor, organist, electric light, printing, etc. Then when all claims have been met the balance is handed to the Evangelists, the financial department is managed by strict business methods. The amount for the three and a half weeks amounted to \$350.00, and the local expenses \$50.00, leaving \$300.00 net for the evangelists, and we think we are quite correct in saying that this community has never made a better investment.

Funeral of Rev. Father Hauck.

The funeral of the late Rev. Philip H. Hauck took place to St. Joseph's Cemetery Hamilton, on Tuesday morning of last week, May 31st. There was a very large gathering of priests, relatives and friends. At 8 o'clock on Monday evening the body was removed from the presbytery to the church, members of the I.C.B.U. acting as pall bearers. The church was appropriately draped and there was a very large congregation present. His Lordship Bishop Dowling officiated and Vespers of the dead were recited by the clergy. The people were then permitted to gaze for the last time on the face of the dead priest.

The solemn funeral mass was celebrated at 10 o'clock. The clergy assembled at 9.30 in the church and recited the office of the dead. The Bishop at his throne was assisted by Rev. Father P. J. McKeon, representing Bishop McEvay, of London, and Rev. J. J. Craven, of Galt. Rev. Father H. Aylmas, C.B., of St. Agatha, was the celebrant, and was assisted by Rev. J. J. Gehl, Formosa, and Rev. S. Forster, New Germany, as deacon and sub-deacon. Rev. Dr. Walters, of Markdale, who succeeded Father Hauck in that parish, was master of ceremonies.—Catholic Register.
