Patton—Richardson—That the petition of Jas. Erskine and 7 others asking that the boundaries of School Sect. No. 3 and Union No. 1, Holland, be changed...

Patton—Kenny—That the clerk ask for prices of 10 inch molds for making tiles for road purposes.

Patton—Richardson—That the clerk be authorized to receive from Geo. McConnell the sum of \$35.12 for provisions supplied by this township while sick with diphtheria.

Wyville for material and work on Saugeen bridge, \$18.15; H. Ward for repairing culvert and attending to bridge in freshet \$3.00; H. Knott for repairs to fourth line \$1.00; John Sewell for material and repairs to Blantyre Hill and for work on 7th line, \$22.50; H. Wyvill, Euphrasia's share for plough broken on road \$1.50; W. J. Fanson for printing \$19.50; J. Leopard for supplies to Geo. McConnell and family \$15.15; Jos. Leopard for attendance to McConnell and family \$28.00; C. W. Rutledge for printing Local Option By-Law \$23.00; C. W. Rutledge for printing minutes and Auditors' Report and Treasurer's Statement \$30.25.
