even with a strong electric light; it is exceedingly difficult to keep the boat trim, and unless the utmost care is exercised she may drop to a depth at which the pressure of water crush her like a nut in a pair of crackers. Then she has to be conwo stantly coming to the surface to find her bearings, and to change her course. She is so delicately balanced that any sudden movements or change of position by her crew may cause her to turn turtle; and she is so slow that she is practically useless glow that she is practically users, against any but a stationary ship.

An interesting, if not very practicable, vessel is the Argonaut, whose function it is to descend to the bottonl of the sea, run along it on wheels to the desired position beneath an enemy's ship, and then by means of mines and torpedoes do the rest-a scheme admirable in theory, og I fear unpromising in practice. The best submarine of them all is Holland, of which we have a smill fotilla. The Holland is realy a formidable weapon, of war.
