Walker vs. Holland.

At the Non-Jury Sittings of the High
Court, held in Owen Sound, a case of
considerable interest to the municipali-
ties in the County of Grey was tried.
We refer to the action brought by Jos.
Walker against the Township of Hol-
land for a declaration regarding the
width of a trespass road. The facts
were as follows:

In 1882 lots 29 and 30 in the 8th con-
cession were patented to one Quinn.
These lots lie to the north of Bell's
Lake, and one of the small lakes juts
into lot 29. In 1885 Charles Rankin,
P.L.S., surveyed this section and laid
out the line between Holland and
Glenelg, etc., as to carry it across Bell's
Lake but this never could become a
public highway without a great ex-
penditure in constructing a bridge and
approaches. Some one started a road
way around Bell's Lake on lots 29 and
30 in the 8th concession and lot 30 in
the 7th concession, and at one time
it would seem that the Government
expended some money on this road,
but in the pitot no mention was made
of it. During the years following the
township at different times expended
money and statute labor on the devia-
tion road, although there had never
been any dedication of the road by the
owners of the lots across which it went.
In 1900 the plaintiff bought the prop-
erty from the Wiegand Bros. and his
deed made no mention of the roadway.
Shortly after becoming the owner of
the property Walker interviewed the
council, and from that time until a year
ago there were negotiations for the
purchase of the roadway, although the
public insisted that it was a public
road by usage. Walker admitted that
the public had a right to the use of so
much of the travelled way as it had ex-
pended money and labor upon, and
failing to make an arrangement with
the township in the summer of 1903 he
proceeded to fence in the roadway,
leaving a passage from ten feet six
inches to fourteen feet wide. By the
order of the council this fence was torn
down and this action was then brought.
Mr. Justice [redacted] [redacted], who tried
the case, held that the public only had the
right to use the amount of the roadway
which Walker claimed, and stated that
if the action proceeded in no event
he would give the township its costs
because of having insisted upon this
road being a 66-foot road. He also
intimated that Walker had fenced in
the roadway too narrow, and that it
was likely if the action was heard to a
finish he would not give the plaintiff
his costs. The plaintiff had all along
tried to get the township to arbitrate
and the judge remarked that he could
not understand why the township had
not done so. At this stage of the pro-
ceedings the judge for a second or
third time recommended a settlement,
and the lawyers for the opposite parties
got together and the result was that it
was agreed that the action should be
dismissed, each party paying its own
costs, but the township undertook to
immediately take proceedings to arbitrate
as the plaintiff requested and to
pay him whatever amount should be
found proper for a deed of a 66-foot
roadway across his two lots, and in
case the township did not proceed as
agreed then he was given the right
to bring his action over again. The
result of this action makes the law
clear, that where there is a trespass
road used by the public, unless that
road has been deeded or dedicated to
the public, its use is confined to so
much as has been in the actual pos-
session of the public evidenced by
wagon tracks and by the expenditure
of statute labor, and that this width
does not extend beyond those limits.
The judge expressed surprise that
township authorities should desire to
take any man's property for the public
without due recompence, even supposing
from good nature the owner had
permitted the use of his lands as a
convenience to his neighbors.
