NOTES AND COMMENTS

Wentworth county council have
passed a wide-tire by-law, fixing the
width of tires of rigs carrying two tons
at three inches, and three tons at four
inches.The Boers are opposed to the intro-
duction of Chinese labor in the Trans-
vaal mines; the English-speaking
whites of South Africa are against the
innovation; so are the religious and
labor sentiment in Great Britain. But
the capitalists who own the mines want
the semi-slave labor; and they are
getting what they want. The incident
is one of the most striking illustrations
we have yet had of the power of orga-
nized capital to control in matters of
public policy.A former Melanchthon lady evidently
considers that marriage is not a failure.
About three years ago, last September
John Neilly, of Melanchthon, died. His
widow had been previously married to
a Mr. Phillips, consequently that was
her second adventure. About a year
after her second husband's death she
married John Howlett, of Garafraza,
who died in July, 1903. Last week
Mrs. Howlett made her fourth matri-
monial venture, and married William
Tindall of Amaranth.After the appointment of committee
meetings, the council rose to meet
again at two o'clock on Tuesday after-
noon.Mr. Allen advocated that each mem-
ber give a verbatim report of the in-
spection of the bridges in their division.He had divided the work with Mr.
Schenck, and stated that the supervision
on those under his jurisdiction had
involved very little expenditure.The council then adjourned until two
o'clock on Tuesday afternoon.

TUESDAY AFTERNOON.

The council met pursuant to adjourn-
ment, with Messrs. Gordon, Schenck
and Thomson in their places, in addition

were confirmed, and the clerk read a large
number of accounts, the majority of
which were for repairs to bridges
and inspection, June session being the
time when these items are more
numerous. Walters Falls Agricultural
Society made application for the usual
grant, referring to the successful
operations of the association. A number
of accounts were presented for advertising
supplies. A letter was read from
Lucas, Wright & MacArchie in the mat-
ter of costs of arbitration respecting
the school section of Sydenham. The
report of the Centre Grey Women's
Institute was read and referred to the
finance committee.Mr. W. J. McLean, secretary of the
Central Agricultural Society, Walters
Falls, was introduced by Mr. A. C.
Paterson, and was given permission to
address the council in support of the
society's application for grant. The
society is independent of the electoral
district societies, and had not received
aid from any other source than that of
its membership and friends, and the
gate receipts. It had been carried on
successfully now for fifteen years, and
was in every respect a purely agricul-
tural organization, demonstrating at
its exhibitions its popularity in this
respect by its increasing prize lists and
patronage. He anticipated the con-
siderable support and for the association
would appreciate any assistance the
county council might be pleased to
grant.The Warden assured Mr. McLean
that the council would be pleased to
take the matter into its full consider-
ation.Mr. McArthur presented his report as
delegate to Annual Trustees Association
held in Toronto.Mr. McArthur brought up the matter
of the change from Kimberley to Heath-
cote for holding the entrance exam-
inations, and submitted correspondence
on the matter, which was referred to
the education committee.On motion of Messrs. Gordon and
Garvie, the council accepted the sug-
gestion of Mr. Gordon that a by-law
be introduced to regulate the use of
bridges near mill ponds. In many
sections of the county bridges under
the council's jurisdiction were being
covered with mill refuse and destroyed
by hauling logs over them without a
vehicle, and the expense to the county
was being largely increased.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Owing to the delay occasioned by
committee work it was eleven o'clock
before Warden Pringle called the
meeting to order. Mr. George A.
Brown of Meaford, who had been ill,
made his first appearance and was
cordially greeted by his fellow members.The clerk read an interesting report
from Inspector N. W. Campbell of
South Grey in which he reported con-
tinued progress in the face of the un-
precedented weather of the past winter
and referring to the generosity of Mr.
A. Gordon, jeweller, of Durham, in
donating medals to be competed for by
pupils in the inspectorate.Application was made by the general
and marine hospital for a grant, inti-
minating that the loss of over \$700 in the
government grant for maintenance had
severely impaired the finances of the
institution.The clerk called attention to the
necessity of a by-law being prepared for
the issue of the debentures for the
bridge repairs and inspection were also
presented.Mr. Thompson presented report No. 1
of the finance committee. Its recom-
mendations were as follows: The ac-
ceptance of the county treasurer's
estimate for 1903, and that the warden
issue his order for \$300 for stationery.
