(Continued from page 4.) Mr. Schoenck contended that the amount levied for the entire county was only getting three per cent for their money in banks, and it would cost the county four or five per cent of the debentures.

Mr. Schoenck's contention was ruled out of order, and on motion the council adjourned until seven o'clock.

WEDNESDAY EVENING. Every member of the council was in his place when at 7.15 Warden Pringle called the meeting to order.

A letter was read from the Prisoners' Aid Association, asking for the Prisoners' Association's work.

A letter was read from W. G. Richardson, contractor for the erection of the new house of refuge, stating that through an error in the township rod two additional courses of brick had been put on the second story and asked to be allowed \$300 for the same.

Amongst the few additional accounts presented were one from J. J. Richardson, for repairs on a Saugeen river bridge; and one from the Christie Bros., Limited, for the Christie firm's contract on the house of refuge.

Mr. McArthur presented the report of the education committee. The recommendations were that the application of \$591.14 to Mount Forest High School for \$41.20, for extra maintenance of pupils from the county of Grey be made; and that the petition of David Muckle, township of Grey, appealing against the action of the township council, be laid over for further information; and that the application of J. Mr. Allen presented the report of the special committee on the house of refuge supplies. The recommendations were the payment of a number of accounts on contract.

He also presented the report of the action of the house of refuge. It recommended the adoption of \$320, and the payment of the same.

Each of the reports presented were adopted without discussion.

THURSDAY AFTERNOON. Owing to the prospective visit of the county council of Bruce and the town council of Warton the session was a brief one. The clerk presented a dozen accounts of a miscellaneous character, including a number from J. McQuaker & Co., under contract for supplies for \$31.90, for inspection and expenses, in connection with the erection of the building; R. P. Butchart & Bro., \$247.70; H. Manders & Co., \$20.05; Christie Bros., Limited, \$37.04, each for repairs and supplies for the county buildings.

The house of refuge committee presented its first report, recommending the payment of the accounts of Christie Bros., Limited, for water works extensions to be charged to capital account; also a number of accounts of John McQuaker & Co., for outfitting supplies under contract; and R. McDowall, \$8.00 for land and sketch of house of refuge land; the latter amount to be charged to J. E. Marsh, the owner of the adjacent land; the clerk filed the sketch and sent account to Marsh for amount due.

The report was adopted without discussion.

Mr. Minnis, of Markdale, who was present, was given permission to add by installing electric lights and wanted to know to whom he was to look for his remuneration.

Mr. Gordon said that the lights were not all installed and the council occurred in his statement that the village of Markdale was under contract to do the necessary lighting.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON. The house of refuge committee recommended the payment of the moving and travelling expenses of caretaker Harness; that a telephone be placed in the house of refuge; that the municipality of Markdale be notified to install the electric lights as per agreement; that the clerk communicate with W. J. McFarland regarding his donation of \$500 toward the building, informing him that the building is practically completed and asking him to forward the amount to the county treasurer by July 1st; that the council meet as a corporation body at the town hall, Markdale on June 24th, and that the clerk notify reeve Shortall and Dr. Egg that the council had so decided; that the chairman be authorized to purchase the required amount of fuel and the amount of \$300 to be issued in his order on the certificate of the chairman for same. The report also recommended an order to be issued, chargeable to Richard's contract, for \$127.45, to discharge a mechanic's lien favor of Allen Coopy, who had been in the house of refuge for \$300 for caretaker's current expenses. A number of accounts of members for attendance in connection with the purchase of a team, attending April meeting at Markdale and on audit were also recommended to be paid.

Mr. McKinnon introduced a bylaw to guarantee local improvement levies of the town of Durham to the amount of \$3270.

FRIDAY EVENING. The warden called the council to order at 7.30. The only communication received was a statement of architect Russell's account in connection with the house of refuge, showing a balance due of \$56. The report of the South Grey Farmers' League was placed in the hands of the clerk and accepted.

Mr. Thomson presented the report of the finance committee which dealt mainly with the equalization of the assessment. The amounts as recommended were embodied in the bylaw confirming the equalization. The account of Charles Gordon for inspection and millage in connection with the house of refuge \$21.90, was also recommended to be paid and the amount charged by special account.

Bylaws 686, to confirm the equalized assessment of the various municipalities for 1905; 687, to appoint two high school trustees for the town of Mesford; 688, to appoint arbitrators to settle the difficulties in school sections 1, 5 and 13 in the township of Sydney; 689, to amend bylaw 645 respecting the remuneration of the public school inspectors; 690, to authorize the issue of debentures to the amount of \$16,000 to cover the cost of erection of the house of refuge; and 681, to levy a rate to meet the current expenses and liabilities of the county of Grey for 1905.
