The C.P.R. will issue return tickets from Markdale on Wednesday afternoon and Thursday good to return on Friday. Thursday the 23rd is Markdale's Civic Holiday.

The citizens band returned Thursday night from a nine days' outing during which they camped at Balmy Beach, Owen Sound. They report having had a genuine good time.

The last championship lacrosse match of the season on the home grounds will be played in Markdale on Friday, July 23rd, between the Wellingtons of Owen Sound and the Aberdeens of Markdale. Game to be called at 5.30.

A. F. Wyville of this place sold last week to J. M. Guardhouse of Weston his entire horse, General Macqueen, to be shipped to South Africa. The price was a good one. He was loaded at Toronto Junction Tuesday together with four other registered Clydesdales, and were the first shipment by the British Government to South Africa for breeding purposes since the war.

The Markdale junior lacrosse team went to Dundalk on Tuesday of this week and defeated the local players to the tune of 4 to 2. The youngsters played really brilliant lacrosse and gave pointers to the senior players of either club. All the Markdale youngsters played well, possibly the most conspicuous being the two Kellys, Sewell and Ballard, while Clare Mercer in goal was good as Dundas. Mr. Rowe accompanied the boys and refereed the game.

The first union Fraternal Society service in this place was held on Sunday evening July 17 which proved a gratifying success. The G.O.O.F., A.O.U.W., I.O.F., and Chosen Friends were well represented and presented a very respectable appearance. Rev. W. A. Rodwell preached a most appropriate sermon for which the large gathering on returning to their lodge room passed a hearty vote of thanks. Bright Young Life Ended.

Francis J. Blair, eldest son of Mr. Robert Blair, formerly of the west back line, Artemesia, died at the residence of his uncle, Mr. Andrew Beattie, Toronto Line, on Saturday last. He suffered with an affection of the throat and came from Aurora, Ill., some two months ago to recuperate, but after some improvement at first an adverse turn set in with above result. The funeral took place on Monday to the Presbyterian cemetery, Orange Valley, and was largely attended, Rev. Mr. Rodwell officiating. Deceased was 35 years of age and unmarried.

Lawn Party at Berkeley

Last Thursday evening, the 21st inst., the English Church people of Berkeley had a most successful lawn party on the grounds of Mr. Sargent, who generously permitted the use of his grounds, although he is not a member of St. Matthias Church; for which kindly permission the Rev. Mr. Neveil as chairman thanked him in the name of the congregation. Mr. I. B. Lucas was to have acted as chairman, but was unable to be present. There was a large attendance of Berkeley people and others, from Markdale, Holland Centre, and elsewhere. Tables laden with stores of provisions were well patronized, while a booth, where fruits, ice cream and other delicacies were sold, did a rushing business. A number of the choir of Christ Church, Markdale, and other accomplished musicians and elocutionists from the same town, under the management of Mr. J. H. Dundas, furnished a programme of rare excellence. The Markdale band was also in attendance and at intervals rendered choice selections to the delight of everyone. A better night for such an entertainment could not have been selected, the sky being cloudless and the moon shining almost at the full. The proceeds amounted to \$82.00.

Fatal Gun Accident.

A gun accident, which proved fatal, happened at the residence of Mr. James Walker, near Kimberley, on the 16th inst. Mr. James Leishman, who came from Edinburgh, Scotland, in January last and recently hired with Mr. Walker, was in the act of taking down a loaded shot gun from its usual place in the kitchen when the trigger caught and the gun discharged the charge, which was of B.B. shot, penetrating the right temple coming out of the forehead on the left side. Dr. Bibby of Flesherton was called but was unable to save the life of the unfortunate young man who lived in a semi-conscious condition for forty-eight hours. The funeral took place to the New England cemetery on Monday. The deceased had no relatives in this country. He was an only son, and his parents and sisters living in Scotland have been advised of the sad event. He was 24 years of age and a fine specimen of manhood being six feet one inch in height. He spent five years in South Africa, passed through over fifteen battles and assisted in the capture of Cronje. He was therefore not a novice with the firearms. The gun which did the fatal deed is said to be over 100 years old and in good condition.
