age, his growing physical infirmities, his recognition of the hopelessness of the Transvaal struggle, and, too, the fact that he was, after all, only human. and it was just average human nature for him to do as he did. If in his exile he was increasingly querulous and bitter, that, too, was only natural. No autocrat enjoys being deposed; specially one who also is a theocrat. He had passed through many stirring scenes and, had performed the labors of a modern Hercules. He had twice been a leading factor in the making of that nation with an absoluteness not often rivalled among despotisms. He has been and was convinced, not less certainly than the German Emperor, that his rule was from God and was specially inspired of God in every moment and in every detail.
