Follower of Dowie Arrested.

Marshall Harmon, an Ontario county farmer, has the sentence of original neglect of his wife hanging over him as the result of leaving her in the tender (?) mercies of Dowie's mixture called Faith Healing. On Saturday last the court found him guilty. Harmon embraced the Dowie faith some time ago, and when his wife gave birth to a child about three months since he neglected to call in proper medical aid. The woman who were with her saw that her case was serious and refused to remain unless a doctor was called in. Harmon claims he admitted the local doctor once, but he was unable to do anything. He sent to Toronto for Rev. Eugene Brooks, who went and prayed for the woman two days, but without avail. The patient lingered on and after some weeks died. Local feeling was intensely indignant. The authorities had the body exhumed and an inquest followed, which led to the arrest of both Harmon and Brooks and the trial. Both Harmon and Brooks are out on bail. The trial is to come up at the December Sessions. It will be watched with interest.

A Sad Drowning Accident.

Many in Walters Falls and vicinity remember Alexander Morrison, who formerly lived on Mr. Shepherson's farm near that place, and who moved to Owen Sound about four years ago. Many hearts were saddened when the news arrived last week that he had been drowned in the harbor at Owen Sound while working on a boom of logs in the employ of The John Harrison & Sons Company, limited. Morrison and his mate, Frank Readman, were on the boom when Alex's pike pole got fouled with the chain that binds the logs together. As the tide moved, Morrison was engaged at the time in booming the raft in towards the tie mill, brought a strain on the logs they unhooked and Morrison had either to hold by the pike pole and go into the water, or let go and take his chances without the pole on the log on which he was standing. He let go the pole and fell into the steamboat channel where the water is twenty feet deep. He tried to seize the boom, but it moved in out of his reach. Readman tried to save him by pushing a log towards him, but it missed him by two feet. He then told Alex not to get excited, as a boat was coming to his rescue, but the unfortunate fellow gave up the struggle when the boat was within fifty feet of him. He was heavily clothed, and his heavily spiked boots took him to the bottom like lead, as he could not swim a stroke. The search for his body was without success, and not until Thursday evening was it recovered. A reward of one hundred dollars for its recovery was offered, and the finder, Frank Readman, gratefully turned this over to Mrs. Morrison. Mr. Morrison was of splendid physique, tall and straight as an arrow, of commanding appearance, and his demise is sincerely mourned. He leaves a widow and two children. Deceased was a son of the late Neil Morrison of Sydenham, and his mother still lives at Boguor. Four brothers, Messrs. Daniel, James, Neil and William Morrison, reside in Sydenham; Mr. Gilbert Morrison, another brother, is a mariner, and there are three sisters, Mrs. Jas. Reid, Mrs. Robert Moffat and Mrs. Joseph Long of Sydenham, and Mrs. Edward Foster of Holland. The funeral to Boguor on Friday last was one of the largest in the history of that section, and was a tangible expression of sympathy for the relatives by the people of that neighborhood.
