House of Refuge Notes.

Mr. Dan Henderson Passed Away. First Death in the House of Refuge.—Other News.

(By An Inmate.) Last week we expressed the hope that our highly esteemed friend and comrade, Mr. Dan Henderson, would shortly be resorted to his wonted state of health and cheerfulness.

But little did we anticipate that this week it would become our painful duty to chronicle his demise. Truly may it be said that, in the midst of life we are in death.

Although from our first acquaintance it was obviously noticeable that he was far from being robust, yet until the last couple of weeks the casual observer would not have detected anything eminently critical in his appearance.

Therefore, it was no wonder that the sudden and unexpected announcement of his death should cast a sad gloom over the institution.

Dan, as he was familiarly called, came to this institution, as a private boarder about three months ago; he was very intelligent, obliging and pleasantly jovial, commanding the esteem of all around him.

It was only during the last two weeks of his life that decline was noticeable, and even then, no one thought his end to be near, as he never took to his bed and did not retire to his room until 9 p. m. of the night previous to his death.

On being aroused by his room-mate on Wednesday morning he was only able to utter a few words incoherently and appeared to be unconscious until his spirit took its flight about noon the same day.

It is presumed that he had an attack of paralysis during the night. At 2.30 p. m. Thursday the caser containing the deceased, was placed on two trestles in the central corridor of the Home, where the inmates and outside friends were assembled to take a last look at his remains and listen to the impressive service of the Church of England, pronounced by the Rev. Mr. Newell.

The remains were interred in Markdale Cemetery, the funeral cortege consisting of his many friends in Markdale and vicinity. They all bemoaned Messrs. C. W. Rutledge, Edward Rutledge, R. W. Ennis, T. Matthews, F. Sarjeant and Jos. Beatty.

The following brief history of the deceased's life was only gathered by your cor. in the frequent social conversation during his residence at the Home. The deceased gentleman was Canadian, born of Irish parents; in youth he chose for his profession, boot and shoe making at which he served one year.

Tiring of this, his inclinations led to sailing and for several years applied his vocation on the great lakes. His attention again reverted to his former trade, which he then thoroughly learned, and was in that business on his own account for many years; as such he is most probably remembered by many in the neighborhood of Kimberley.

Failing in health, he found it necessary to retire to private life and came to Markdale where he resided until he came to the institution. Being steady and industrious he had saved a competency sufficient for his day. He was a life-long member of the Church of England. In politics, he was a staunch Conservative.

We greatly miss him at the Home. There were two admissions to the Home during the past week, viz.—Mrs. Rutland of Sydenham and Donald Douglas of Proton. The old married couple from Sydenham, (not St. Vincent, as erroneously reported last week,) have not yet arrived. The following is the present standing of the inmates, men 21, women 5, total 26. Among the congregation was the Rev. Mr. Humphreys, former pastor of Euphrasia and Pricewille circuits. Mrs. (Rev.) Humphreys and little son were also present. The Rev. gentleman offered up a very impressive opening prayer, and closed the congregation at the close of the sermon, and pronounced the Benediction. Mrs. Saunders, aged inmate, offered up the closing prayer in her usual fervent and feeling manner. The singing by the congregation was especially impressive and enjoyable. May such meetings long be continued.
