

A cattle buyer drove into the yard of farmer about fifty miles from Chicago the other day and made an offer for all the cattle and pigs on hand, delivery to be made at once. The offer seemed a good one, but before closing the farmer said he would speak to his wife. Going to the house he asked his wife to call up a Chicago commission house, by telephone, says a writer in the Chicago Tribune. In the farmhouse the telephone begins to get busy at five o'clock in the morning. At dinner time calls of many go back and forth over the line, but it is in the evening, after supper, that neighbor meets neighbor, disoussing the crops and all matters of mutual interest. Housewives gossip of family affairs, and a community of interest is had, not only over all the country, but all over as much of the country as may be desired. When the farmer goes to bed he does not feel that he is out of the world nor have sorry dreams of his isolation. If the metropolis is the comet he is hitched on to the tail with the very decided advantage that he is not close enough to get burned, and he can let go if he wants to.
