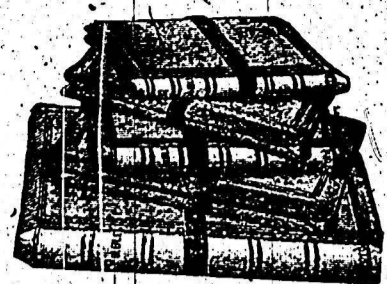

FLESHERTON HAPPENINGS

The mysterious disappearance of a customer's caprine from T. J. Mr. George Anderson Dead.

It becomes our duty this week to chronicle the death of Mr. George Anderson, Jr., of 6th con. Glenelg, who departed this life on Wednesday, Nov. 16th, after a lingering and painful illness from one of the most dreadful ailments which afflicts to human beings—cancer. George was a son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Anderson and was the fourth of a family of twelve, six boys and six girls. He was born in Dumfriesshire, Scotland, on August 3rd, 1852, and was therefore 53 years of age at the time of his death. When in his prime he was a strong man and few there were that could do more work in the harvest or logging field. His services were much sought after by timbermen as he was expert at the business.

In the year 1888 he married to Miss Maggie McPherson, who still survives him but without issue. He subsequently purchased lot 20, concession 7, Glenelg, near Pinnacle Hill farm, better known as the old homestead, where he farmed for a time, but since early last spring he has been unable to do any manual labor. Shortly after his marriage cancer made its appearance on his lower lip which he had removed by the surgeon's knife, but all modes of treatment from time to time were of no avail. It was of a most malignant type, and at last worked into his mouth and throat. The Rev. Mr. Matheson, of Riceville, who visited him and was his spiritual adviser during his illness, preached a brief but impressive funeral sermon at the house and also officiated at the grave. A large funeral cortege of relatives and friends followed the remains to their last resting place in the family plot in Zion cemetery, where a handsome monument has been erected in memory of his late father who died on February 2nd, 1900.

Words fail us in expressing praise (due to the deceased's) for Mrs. (Mrs. Jas. Mantle, of Tilsonton), who spent about five months assisting her aged mother in administering to the wants of the afflicted, and in endeavoring to alleviate his sufferings in every way possible. As before intimated deceased was the fourth eldest of a family of twelve, four of which were born in Scotland. All grew to manhood and womanhood's estate except one girl which died in infancy, unnamed. Beginning with the eldest the names and present abode of family as far as known are as follows: Irving, in Glenelg; Maggie, (first wife of the late Archibald Butler) died on October 18, 1883; John, last heard of at Dunith; Geo. Simpson, Vancouver, B.C.; Mary, wife of James Manly, Elginburg; James, at Fort William; Martha, wife of G. H. Grant, Toronto; Lavinia, wife of Duncan Simpson, Alberta; Alexander, at Warden, B.C.; Thomas, on the old homestead.
