That inquisitive Boy.

Rev. and Mrs. Wilson of Flesherton were in town Tuesday and gave THE STANDARD a pleasant call.

"Making calendars."

The boy comes in, "Making calendars? Give me one!"

"They are not ready yet."

"Say, how long does it take to make a calendar?"

"Oh, about a week."

"How many are you making?"

"Seventeen hundred."

"How much paper does it take to make seventeen hundred calendars like them?"

"Thor's four hundred pounds of paper in these seventeen hundred calendars."

"And how do you get them delivered?"

"We enclose one in THE STANDARD Christmas week to every subscriber who's subscription is paid one year in advance."

"Say, I'd like to make calendars. You say it takes a week to make a calendar."

"Yes, we make the whole lot in a week."

"You make one month at a time do you?"

"Yes, we cut seventeen hundred sheets of paper for January, seventeen for February, and so on for the 12 months, making 20,400 slips; then have to be printed 1700 for each month."

Then after being printed we place these piles along, in a row on a table and go along taking a leaf of each pile, the 12 piles—12 months, repeating this operation 1700 times, and then fold them."

"And then the 20,400 slips have to be handled one by one. What then?"

"Then we stitch them with this wire stitcher, each 12 slips together to make a year."

"Then what?"

"Then 1,700 bristle board backs are printed, and these have all to be punched."

"What are they punched for?"

"We punch a hole for hanging them up."

"Anything more?"

"Yes, we fasten one of these tabs on each bristle board back with the wire stitcher."

"Say, I don't think I'd care for the job. But say, Mister, how much do you get for them? Seems to me you ought to get a good lot for all that work, and all that paper, and wire staples, and bristleboard."

"What do you get for the lot?"

"Sometimes we get hearty thanks, but more frequently not even thanks."

"Gee, whiz! I wouldn't make a calendar."
