Deceased, whose maiden name was Jane Hamilton, was born at Crown Hall, Iniskillen, Fermanagh County, Ireland, in 1820 being 84 years of age at the time of her demise. In 1842 she emigrated to Canada with a number of relatives, and a short time after arrival was wedded to the late Robert McFadden. They settled in the township of Flamboro', Wentworth County. In 1851 they came northward and settled on the Toronto and Sydenham Road on the homestead, about 2½ miles north of this place, altho' Markdale did not then exist. Mr. McFadden died in 1873. Since the marriage of her daughters, Mrs. McFadden has lived with her children, particularly at the home of her eldest daughter. The deceased lady has been a devoted and faithful member of the Methodist Church since childhood, was of a kind and hospitable nature and always of a most friendly and generous disposition.

Of a family of ten, namely: John W. of the suburbs; Richard and Thomas, of Mono Centre; Mrs. Robert Carson, Allenford; Robert, who died in 1871; James, on the homestead; Mrs. Andrew Carson, of Elsinore, Bruce Co.; and Mrs. Wm. McFadden, Arkwright, five sons and four daughters survive. These, with one sister, Mrs. Leary, of this place, and thirty-eight grand-children are left to mourn her departure.

The body was brought down per C. P. R. train on Thursday evening, the funeral taking place on Friday at two o'clock from the home of her sister, Mrs. Leary, Toronto, street, to the Markdale Public Cemetery. A short and appropriate service was held at the house by Rev. Mr. Rodwell. Her five sons and a son-in-law, Mr. Robert Carson, acted as pall-bearers.
