Indian Head Prosperity

(From the Village)

H. H. Campkin, of the firm of Campkin & Lee, Indian Head, Assn., left Friday evening for home after performing the duties of delegate to the Anglican Synod. The progress and prosperity of the Indian Head district makes Mr. Campkin a very busy man at the time to attend the synod meeting was a little sacrifice on his part. Indian Head was one of the favored districts this year in the matter of crops and all are satisfied with the wheat yield which averages 25 bushels per acre for the district. Some farmers thrashed as high as 40 and 45 bushels per acre and the output for the district is now found to be greater than ever before.

Among the farmers who have heavy yields from three-quarters to two sections are the following: E. Boon, 20,000 bushels; Wm. Douglas, 19,000; Thos. Livingstone, 21,000; J. E. Francis, 22,500; A. E. Wilson, 19,000; T. E. Jackson, 17,000; H. P. Gardner and Davidson, estate, 18,000; and Campkin and Lee, on the old Bell farm, 10,000. These yields grade high and the average is circulated to be 20.2 Northern.

The deliveries at Indian Head for the past week were exceptionally heavy and five of the thirteen elevators are completely blocked, although the C. P. R. assures the farmers that the wheat can be handled.

The success of the crops have given new life to the town, and the corporation is now considering the installation of waterworks and a street lighting plant under municipal ownership. These improvements are expected next year and will add greatly to the advantages of the town. During the past

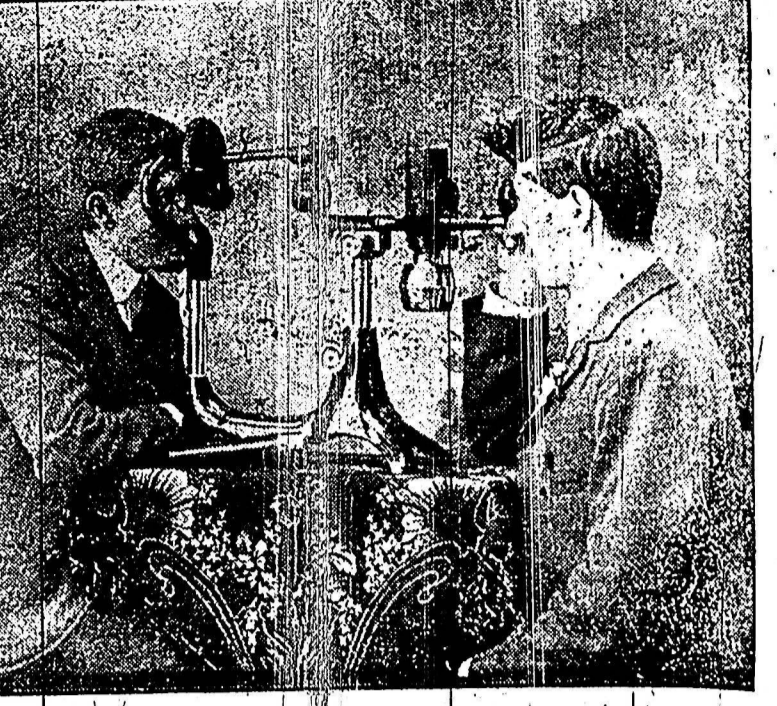
