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BIG SIEGE GUNS BATTERING

More Serious Situation Now Faces the Russian Army.

JAPS MOVING EAST.

A despatch from London says: Reports received here show that part at least of the Russian cavalry reported to be at Tachia have gone back to the north with some loss, but the precise outcome of the raid is not known. It does not seem to have developed importantly.

It is reported in St. Petersburg that a large Japanese force is moving east to outflank the Russians.

A correspondent at the Russian headquarters says that the position seems to have been made more complicated and more uncertain by the battle of Hailu and the approach of an early spring. The Japanese have brought up many siege guns from Port Arthur, and some of them are pounding Poutloff Hill. Chinese reports say that 350 siege guns are in position at Liao-Yang.

SICKNESS AND WOUNDS.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says: An official return shows that since the commencement of the war Russian sick and wounded to the number of 130,420 had been sent to the rear. Of these 4,007 died in the hospitals, 17,732 recovered, but are incapable of further military service. It has been ascertained that the explosions by which the Russians hoped to destroy them affected only their plating, and did not damage their structural parts.

VLADIVOSTOCK HIS AID.

A despatch from Tokio says: There is reliable information to the effect that when Gen. Kawamura left Tokio early this month for Corea his mission was to make an advance on Vladivostock. The route of his advance has not been disclosed.

The Tokio newspapers have noted the continued withdrawal to the northward in Northern Corea of small bodies of Russians. It is stated that the fortifications of Vladivostock have been greatly strengthened lately.

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

NOTES OF PROCEEDINGS IN THE HOUSE OF COMMONS.

LIFEBOAT CRISIS.

Mr. St. Clair was informed by Sir Wilfrid Laurier that the Government had had thirteen lifeboat crews on the St. Lawrence, costing \$4,265 for maintenance last year.

CLOVER SEED EXPORTED.

Mr. Cockshutt was informed by Mr. Patterson that the value of Canadian clover seed exported in 1902-03 and '04 was as follows:—1902, 192,225 bushels, worth \$1,201,678; 1903, 119,496 bushels, worth \$839,459; 1904, 230,484 bushels, worth \$1,257,132; and the grain seed exported was 1902, 187,715 bushels, worth \$88,193; 1903, 65,324 bushels, worth \$75,464; 1904, 101,453 bushels, worth \$77,825. They were exported to the following countries:—Great Britain, Belgium, United States, Denmark, Germany, Australia, Holland, New Zealand, France, Newfoundland, Norway and Sweden and St. Pierre.

HOUSE AFFECTED.

A despatch from Berlin says: The House here is considerably influenced by the peace rumors. It is widely believed that secret negotiations between Russia and Japan are actually proceeding.

NO BACKDOWN.

A despatch from Paris says: The terms, alleging the highest authority for its assertion, says that Russia has no set in the military situation any reason to compromise. An unfortunate Autumn campaign has compelled Russia to prolong throughout the winter preparations which will be uninterrupted. Decisive operations are not expected before the end of spring.

A GENERAL ATTACK.

A despatch from Moscow says: The Japanese began a heavy cannonade Tuesday afternoon on the Russian right flank, and the firing continued all through the day. It is thought the Japanese are preparing for a general attack. The Russian guns are replying.

The entire detachment of Japanese cavalry which came within the railway bridge between Mukden and Harbin was wiped out. Russian cavalry overtook the raiders, who refused quarter, and fought until the last man was killed.

A CAVALRY MOVEMENT.

A despatch from Tokio says: The Russians have begun an extensive cavalry movement against Field Marshal Oyama's extreme left. Tuesday night they were attempting to cross the Han River, west of Liao-Yang with 9,000 horsemen. The operation began west of Chitauz. A force of cavalry, stole into Lachushan, and simultaneously another cavalry force approached Tachia, which is situated 13 miles south-west of Chitauz, and 27 miles west of Liao-Yang. Nine thousand cavalry with artillery, approached the river a mile below Tachia, and attempted to cross at 6 o'clock in the evening advancing on Heikouiti (Tchikowai).

The shelling of Oyama's centre continues.

SPILT CARD GAME.

A despatch from Russian headquarters, Liao-Yang, Manchuria, says: During the Japanese bombardment of Poutloff (Lone Tree) Hill a projectile from a siege gun entered an underground hut, burst inside and tore off the head of a lieutenant and wounded a colonel and two staff captains who were playing cards.

In 1902 of Koudov, on the right bank, the Russians are trying to effect a concentrated siege and mortar batteries with good results, firing as many as 20 mortars simultaneously.

WAR OF THE CIGARETTE.

Bill introduced in New York State Assembly.

A despatch from Albany says: A bill prohibiting the sale and manufacture of cigarettes in New York was introduced in the Assembly on Thursday. The penalty is not less than \$50 or more than \$1,000 fine.
