the ice and snow beneath.


Sections of our excellent macadam

A fire broke out in the finishing room
of the Durham Furniture Factory
about 7:30 p.m. on Thursday last, and
by 9:30 had completely destroyed the
building and contents. The dry kiln
and a large stock of lumber were saved
with difficulty. It is not known how
the fire originated. The company has
been six years in operation, and were
in a flourishing condition, and paying
some \$10,000 in wages annually. The
total loss is estimated at \$50,000. The
town council is to grant assistance to
the company in the re-building of the
factory, and the directors expect to
have everything running in full blast
within three months.

Hayward's Falls in Harness

MINNEHAHA may be more noted for their hospitality and sociability in poesy and story. About ten years ago the property was acquired by W. L. Falkingham, for its mighty volume and power; Eugenia, for its greater leap and whose loss last August and rugged gorge; but for scenic set, of his sunny, cheery, busy helpmate for picturesque surroundings and excited the sympathy of the whole world charm all its own, Hayward's countryside. For perseverance, persistence and power to overcome obstacles, storms or bad roads the Minnis Bros. have few equals. Much of the credit is due to Mr. Whitehead, who engineered the work, and to his skilled workmen. Beside the electric wire is a good telephone communication, the erection of that line of poles and strings of wire itself being a heavy task. Mr. F. J. Little is the electrician in charge, and through he modestly professes to know very little about the wonderful power, yet he deftly touches the intricate machinery with the skill of a wizard and the technical terms fall from his lips with a familiarity that clearly evinces he is no novice in the electrical art. We found him courtesy itself and despite our befogged senses, was able to give us a very clear conception of the workings of the various latest improved up-to-date appliances.

A little over three weeks ago Miss Speer went to visit her sister, who was ill, and though not robust was in her usual health till less than twenty-four hours of her death, which was due to a general collapse of the system. On Thursday the remains were brought by her father to her late home from where the funeral took place the following day to the Presbyterian cemetery, Orange Valley. An appropriate service was conducted at the house by the family pastor, Rev. L. W. Thom, of Flesherton, who also performed the last rites at the grave. The deceased was 34 years of age. She was an amiable young woman, living a consistent Christian life which had its influence for good on all about her. Four sisters of the deceased are married. One sister and only brother are at home with the aged father who feels very keenly the great loss sustained. Many friends sincerely sympathize with him and the members of his family in their sorrow.
