

ROOSEVELT AS MEDIATOR THE WORLD'S MARKETS

REPORTS FROM THE LEADING TRADE CENTRES.

Prices of Cattle, Grain, Cheese, and Other Dairy Produce at Home and Abroad.

Toronto, April 4.—Wheat—No. 2 white and red are quoted at \$1.04 to \$1.05 outside. No. 2 green quoted at 89 to 90c east. Northern wheat is easier, with No. 2 Northern at 99c lake ports at opening of navigation. No. 2 Northern at 91c to 96c, and No. 3 Northern at 89 to 90c.

Oats—No. 2 white are quoted at 41 to 42c at outside points, and at 44c here. No. 2 white at 43c to 44c east.

Barley—No. 2 quoted at 46 to 47c middle freight. No. 3 extra at 45c, and No. 3 at 43c middle freight.

Peas—The market is steady, with dealers quoting 67 to 68c at outside points.

Corn—Canadian yellow quoted at 47 to 48c, and mixed at 47c west, guaranteed sound. American No. 3 yellow, 56c Toronto, and No. 3 mixed at 56c.

Rye—No. 2 is nominal at 69 to 70c at outside points.

Flour—Ninety per cent. patents are quoted at \$4.45 to \$4.50 in buyers' sacks, east or west, straight rollers of special brands, for domestic trade in bbls., \$5 to \$10. Manitoba flour unchanged. No. 1 patents, \$5.50 to \$5.60; No. 2 patents, \$5.30 to \$5.40, and strong bakers, \$5.20 to \$5.25 on track, Toronto.

Meat—At outside points bran is quoted at \$1.50 to \$1.60 and shorts at \$1.75. Manitoba bran in sacks, \$18 to \$19, and shorts at \$20 to \$21.

COUNTRY PRODUCE.

Apples—Choice stock, \$2.50 to \$3 per bushel; cooking apples, \$1.50 per bushel.

Beans—Primer sell in small lots at \$1.60 to \$1.65, and hand-picked \$1.70 to \$1.75 per bushel.

Hops—The market is unchanged at \$2 to \$3c according to quality.

Honey—The market is quiet at 7c to 8c per lb. Comb honey, \$1.75 to \$2 per dozen.

Evaporated Apples—Dealers quote 5c, and dried at 3 to 3½ per lb.

Maple Syrup—Genuine syrup quoted at \$1 to \$1.15 per Imperial gallon, and mixed at 90c. Sugar is quoted at 9 to 10c per lb.

Hay—Car lots, 1 timothy

are quoted at \$8 to \$8.50 on track here, and No. 2 at \$6.50 to \$7.

Straw—The market is unchanged, with car lots quoted at \$6 to \$6.50 on track, Toronto.

Potatoes—Car lots of Ontarios are quoted at 60 to 65c per bag, on track, and jobbing lots at 70 to 75c.

Poultry—Spring chickens, 12 to 13c per lb.; hens, 9 to 10c; ducks, 11 to 12c per lb.; geese, 10 to 11c per lb.; turkeys, dry picked, 15 to 16c; do, scalded, 11 to 12c per lb.

THE DAIRY MARKETS.

Butter—Finest 4lb. rolls are quoted at 22 to 23c per lb.; large rolls at 20 to 21c; tubs, 20 to 21c, and low grades at 16 to 17c. Creamery prints, 25 to 26c per lb.; and solids at 23 to 25c.

Eggs—they sell at 16c to 17c per dozen in case lots.

Cheese—Large cheese are selling at 11 to 11½c, and twins at 12 to 12½c.

Caucasus Are in Revolt and Follow.

The correspondent of the London Times on the rebellion against Britain in the Caucasus, chiefly at Batum, Erivan and Kars. Proclaimed a republic of six provinces, it has proved futile, and may perhaps provoke a recurrence of lawlessness. The Czar's rescript to General Maximovitch and his soldiers to restore the national language to the schools, and to give the Poles, and the influence of the siege proclamations in Poland, it is feared, will provoke a movement similar to that in the Caucasus.

The Church is resuming its religious services at St. Petersburg, having been compelled to disperse by the police.

The Czar's edict, which was issued on a basis of one deputy for every 200,000 people, would give Russia 78,000 deputies, the Caucasus 78,000, and Poland 80.

80 POUNDS OF SILVER.

Big Lump of Rich Old From the Temiskaming District.

A despatch from Toronto says:

Mr. Gibson, the Director of Mines,

has in his office an immense nugget of silver taken from the Trethewy mine, near Cobalt, on the Temiskaming Railyway.

It is a striking example of the richness of mineral deposits in that district.

Twenty-five inches long, twelve inches wide, and two inches thick, it is practically solid.

Mr. Gibson says:

Value at about \$500.

Five openings are now being worked in that locality, since its discovery, a year ago.

A half-million dollars worth of ore has been shipped from the district.

It is not only bear a large proportion of silver, but also cobalt.

Recently other veins have been discovered, which have proved very rich.

WHEAT FIELDS FAILING.

United States Farmers Must Change Their Methods.

A Washington despatch says: "Our great wheat fields are the northern prairies, refusing to grow wheat, said James Wilson, Secretary of Agriculture on Wednesday, "and unless the American farmer changes their method of growing it, he will be a failure." GRANTS TO HOSPITALS.

Hon. W. J. Hanna, Provincial Secretary, has decided that only public hospitals should be entitled to share in the grants made by the Government for the construction of new hospitals in the past.

Private hospitals have been allowed to participate, but in the future all applicants must be duly registered and recognized as public charities.

The Government grant for this purpose has for some years been \$110,000 a year.

The sum is divided according to the length of stay of patients.

Thus, whatever may be the number of patients, the amount will have to do so.

The average cost of a patient is more like 3,000 dollars a year.

Virtually a matter of dollars and cents.

The Imperial authorities would have to pay the bill.

It is believed that the custom could be made general in a year or two.

The advantage is the prevention of shrinkage, and thereby keeping the cheese moist and tasty.
