### Grey County News Items.

The Happenings of the Past Week in the County of Grey.

Chatsworth lacrosse club was organized last week.

Wainton is making preparations for a monster 12th July celebration.

Shelburne pays \$800 a year for the lighting of its streets and town hall.

Mrs. Agnes Goheen, aged seventy six years, died at Dundalk on Friday of last week.

A thief slipped behind the counter of Geo. Lawrence's store in Durham on Friday last and extorted fifteen dollars from the till.

Mr. John Wilson of Dromore has been to Toronto recently undergoing treatment for cancer. He has returned home and is unimproved.

Holstein is to have a newspaper. It will be known as the "Holstein Leader." Mr. Seim of Aylton will hold down the editorial tripod.

The smoke stack on Oldland's wheelbarrow factory in Meaford was blown down and smashed beyond the possibility of repair by the high winds on Tuesday of last week.

Mr. Joseph Weber of Eugenia has invented a chimney cleaner, and intends to have the apparatus patented. It will clean any chimney from three to ten and a half inches in width.

Henry Banks, near Orangeville, aged 83 years, was butted by a ram in the yard of his son-in-law, Alex. Burnett, Amaranth township, and was so seriously injured that he died a few hours afterwards.

Rev. Edward Applebyard, of Euphrasia, has been appointed by the Bishop of Huron to be rector of St. George's Church, Clarksburg, in the room of Rev. George Keyes, superannuated. Mr. Applebyard will assume the pastorate of the church on Easter Sunday.

An Owen Sound correspondent writes that a "Jack-the-Hammer" has appeared there, and has already strenuously kissed several ladies. The result is that the streets are crowded highly with anxious old maids who are ready to fall into the arms of that hogger on his first appearance.

Durham ratepayers will vote on a by-law this week to aid and assist the Durham Furniture Company in rebuilding and operating their factory which was destroyed by fire three weeks ago. The by-law calls for a gift of \$10,000 to the Company and also to grant aid by way of loan of the further sum of \$10,000.

Mr. John Field of Toronto, son of Mrs. James Johnston of Fletchertown, who some time ago underwent an operation for dental cyst, had another and more serious operation last week when the lower right jawbone was removed from near the centre of the chin to near the ear. Complications set in and Mr. Field is at present in a critical condition.

A number of rural merchants in the vicinity of Owen Sound are being deprived of a great deal of business by the foreign pedlars who are very numerous in this county. Many of these pedlars have been fined repeatedly for pursuing their avocation without a license, and petitions are now being circulated throughout the country requesting the County Council to increase the annual license fee of the pack pedlar to \$125; and to fix the fee of pedlars owning horses and conveyances at \$25 per annum. The real object of these petitions is to abolish the pedlar trade.

On Wednesday morning of last week Mr. R. Trimble, Flesherton, received a letter from a gentleman residing in Holland township, the letter being posted at Markdale. The contents of this letter were a surprise to Mr. Trimble, and were worthy of being made public. They consisted of a dollar bill and a note to the effect that the writer some 48 years ago had purchased half a pound of tobacco, price "ten-pence," and which had never been paid for. The note quaintly ended with the following postscript: "Quit tobacco 20 years." At the time of this purchase Mr. Trimble kept a store north on this village of the Toronto and Sydenham line. Advance.

## Artemesia Council.

Artemesia Council met in the town hall on Saturday, April 1st. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of former meeting read and confirmed.

The following communications were read: Mrs. E. Neilson, regarding trespassing on her lands; the trustees of S. S. No. 3 asking council to authorize the borrowing of \$2500 to build new school house; Geo. Thompson, et al., regarding opening of base line in rear of 3rd range N.E. at lots 103 to 108; the Clerk of the city of Toronto, asking the council to join in a petition to the Legislature to have the Municipal Act changed so as to permit married women to vote on certain questions; K. W. McKay, Secy. of Elgin County Municipal Association asking the council to appoint representatives, to join with them in the formation of a provincial delegation to wait on the government and urge the amendment of the Municipal Corporations' Bill not be civilly responsible for damages; Messrs. Rees and O'Donohue waited upon the council in regard to sale of their water power at Eugenia Falls; Messrs. R. Campbell, H. Cairns, John Boland, G. Warling and others waited upon the council regarding changing boundaries of S. S. 11 & 13; Mr. H. Duckett waited upon the council in reference to the appointment of postmaster at Eugenia.

Blythe 651 to change boundaries of S. S. 11 and 13 on the 9th and 10th concessions, was introduced and read a first time and after passing through the usual routine became law.

McKenzie-Best.—That the school trustees School Section No. 3 asking this council to sanction the issue of debentures to the extent of \$2500 for the use of said trustees in building a new school house be entertained and that a by-law be prepared and passed at next session of this council.—Carried.

Carson-Best.—That Donald McMillen be paid \$25.00 for repairing Saugan bridge on South line.—Carried.

McKenzie-Carson.—That in reference to the application of Mrs. E. Neilson for alleged damages sustained by public traffic being diverted from the highway across her property, Mr. Best is appointed to enquire into the matter and report at the next meeting of this council.—Carried.

Carson-Purvis.—That this council be in harmony with the matter contained in circular from the City Clerk of Toronto viz.: that the Election Act be so changed as to allow married women to vote on certain questions; and that the Reeve sign the petition to be presented to the Ontario Legislature for that purpose.—Carried.

McKenzie-Carson.—That the petition of George Thompson, et al., asking to have part of base line at lots 103 to 13, 3, N.E. opened for winter travel be referred to Messrs. Best and Purvis, to be examined and reported upon at next meeting.—Carried.

Purvis-Best.—That the Reeve and Clerk are hereby appointed representatives from this council in conformity with the request of the County of Elgin Municipal Association to attend convention on April 12 in the matter of amending the Act regarding civil responsibility of council for damages on highways.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advance.
