Union School Sections Formed

Two Arbitrations for the formation of Union School Sections were held here on May 4th and 5th. In each case the prayer of the petitioners was granted and a Union School Section formed of all or part of the lands asked in the petition. By the first a new Union was formed out of the village comprising Public School Section No. 14, Artemesia, as at present constituted, together with lots 13 and 14 and the west half of lot 15 in con. 14, Artemesia, and lot No. 1 in the 10th and 11th concessions of Euphrasia and the west half of lot No. 1 in con. 9, Euphrasia. By the second a new Union was formed in the Thibaudan Settlement, south-west of the village, the centre of the section to be near Minnie's Mill or some place to the south of it.

The arbitrators were Judge Hatton, Inspector Campbell, W. J. Bellamy of Fiesherton, and N. L. Curry of Rocklyn, on the first; and Messrs. William McLoughry, Mark Armstrong, Thos. Davis and the Judge and Inspector on the second. The opposition in either case was slight, being in the latter case from Markdale, which loses a considerable tract of land which was detached to form the new Union School Section 18, Artemesia and Glenelg.
