They are advertising very extensively and some people are always imagining you have to go away from home. The flour and feed men all over the country handling this outside flour are very often found to be making mistleading statements, one of which is that the mills here do not make vanitous flour. We po and just as good as can flour. We no, and just as good as can be made. The Manitoba flour made in Manitoba was sold when wheat was at top-notch price at \$6.00 per barrel. Wheat has gone down 10c per bushel but the outside flour remains the same price. Now why patronize an outside (or I might say "foreign" for such it is as far as our local market is concerned) as far as our local market is concerned; article when you can get the same thing at home for \$5.60, bags included, saving 40c per barrel. We keep the price of flour in touch with the rise and fall of the wheat market. I have a mill cauable of manufacturing as good flour as was ever made, and I do make flour as was ever made, and I do make a Manitoba Patent Flour called Ford's Patent that criniot be excelled. The past six months two cars of western made flour have been unloaded in Markdale, but no feed. Had these two cars of flour been manufactured in Markdale mills there would have been 16 tous of bran and shorts to sell. Farmers coming to the mill every day

Another reason is western feed would cost more. Now, farmers and fellow townsmen, would you patronize outside flour mills and pay higher prices for the same flour as you can get at home and expect the local mills to supply you with feed that is 100 per That is exactly the situation and most people have never given this subject a thought, but I trust you will in future buy your flour at home and help build
