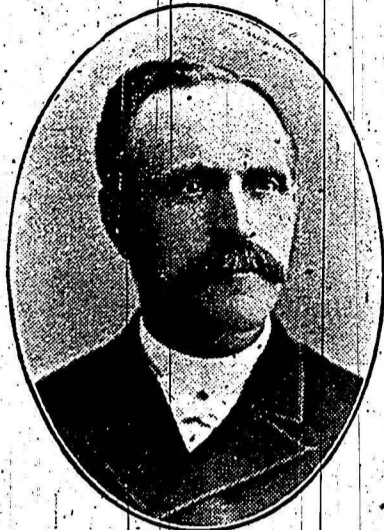

The excursion to Guelph last Thursday under the auspices of the Centre Grey Farmers Institute was patronized by quite a number from this place and vicinity. This is one of the most popular outings of the summer season in the rural districts, and ever since the excursions were arranged they have been growing in popularity and have been more largely patronized. The weather was all that could be desired for the excursion, and the society is well pleased with the result.
On Friday evening last Mr. and Mrs. W. A. Armstrong entertained very pleasantly at their home the members of the Methodist church choir, of which Mr. Armstrong is leader. During the evening the choir sprang a surprise on their host by presenting him with a beautifully worded address and a handsome silver ring. The address was eulogistic of Mr. Armstrong's talent and ability as leader of the choir, and also expressed the happy relationship which exists between the members of that body and their leader, and the assistance which he has so freely rendered in their behalf both in the service of song and the teaching of music entrusted to his care. Mr. Armstrong feelingly replied, thanking the donors most heartily for their handsome gift.



REV. W. A. RODWELL

Rev. W. A. Rodwell, whose portrait appears above, began his ministry in England, his first charge being in the historic city of Canterbury, after which he was stationed in Brighton and the Isle of Wight; from whence he came to Canada with three others in 1874 at the request of the Church authorities to meet the pressing needs of the work here. His first station in Canada was at Wingham, after which he was stationed at Etobicoke, Brampton and Aurora; then he was removed to Forest, where he remained three years, then he was stationed at Stouffville for three years; from thence he moved to Rosemont where he remained three years; from thence to Tottenham and Beeton where at the end of two years he was removed by the conference to take charge of Agnes St. Church, Toronto, where he labored three years with great success, having the joy of receiving about 400 members into the church and of marrying 120 couples. On leaving he was presented with a silver chalice and a \$75.00 gold watch. From thence he moved to Parry Sound where he spent four happy and successful years, three as Chairman of the District and pastor of the town church, and one year as Conference

Evangelist. From Parry Sound he was called to Clinton St. Church, Toronto, to succeed Rev. R. P. Bowles, where he spent three years, leaving with the present of a purse of gold as an expression of the esteem of the people. On account of poor health he was compelled to relinquish city work here, although three charges were open to him, viz: Agnes St. for a second term, North Parkdale, and Centennial Church, Toronto. From Toronto he removed to Cooksville, one of the best country circuits in the Toronto Conference, where he had three successful and happy years and then he was called to Markdale, Cooksville he was healthfully, from where he earned and faithful ministrations have been crowned with numerical, financial and spiritual success. He has not missed one Sabbath or service during the three years on account of sickness. He leaves Markdale for Bolton to which field he was invited early last fall.
Mr. Rodwell has a broad charity and a warm heart towards the churches of other denominations, and his relations with the other churches of the town have been of the most fraternal nature.

The Methodist Conference Takes Mr. Rodwell and Sends Mr. Wilson.

In the departure of Rev. W. A. Rodwell from the pastorate of the Methodist church Markdale loses a good preacher and one of its most indefatigable workers. During his pastorate Mr. Rodwell has guided the fortunes and aspirations of his people towards many improvements in the church, among them being the interior decorations of the building, which took place last month and which cost in the neighborhood of \$500.00. The building, thanks to him, looks more beautiful in the interior than when first built, and it must be with wholesome pride that its people walk up the broad steps into the beautiful house of worship. At Harkaway, his other appointment, many improvements have taken place, among them being the erection of a large \$500 shed, which is said to be one of the finest in the county. Mr. Rodwell seemed to be a very busy man. He could not be idle. He has endeared himself to his people by his strong social qualities and his zeal as a preacher of the gospel. In the pulpit he loved to present the Conqueror rather than to engage in the ways of the combatant, and so by personal energy and magnetism as well as by his pastoral and pulpit achievements, he maintained the traditions of his church here and leaves it full of blessing and promise. He left on Wednesday for his new charge at Bolton, the family following on Thursday. To his successor, Rev. J. S. Trivison Wilson, B.A., B.D., of Ploverston, the town can but offer its warm welcome and hope that his church, which is capable of infinite possibilities, will be a cordial and compact body, eager to promote the best things attainable in ethical and spiritual culture.
