Rev. J. S. Ivison Wilson, B.A., B.D., was born in Beaverton, Ontario, in 1858, and is the son of Rev. J. C. Wilson of Newcastle, ex President of the Bay of Quinte Conference. He received his High School education at Oranmore, and graduated in arts at Victoria University in 1891 with first class honors and silver medal in Philosophy, Logic and Civil Polity. In 1897 while engaged in circuit work he completed his Divinity course and received the degree of Bachelor of Divinity from the same university. While on probation he served for two years at Little Britain and one year at Brechin. Since ordination he has spent terms in the Wildrid and South Darlington circuits in the Bay of Quinte Conference, and has just completed a term of four years at Flesherton.

## Death of Mrs. Ann Bowler.

After being an invalid for many years, and unconscious for some months, Mrs. Ann Bowler, relict of the late William Bowler of the suburbs, regained consciousness and with a natural smile bid adieu to her friends and passed peacefully away on Monday, June 26, 1905. The funeral took place on Tuesday, Rev. W. A. Rodwell officiating in a very feeling manner. Deceased was born in Montreal in 1817, was married when sixteen years old, and in 1849 moved with her husband to the farm on which she resided up to her death. This part was then an unbroken wilderness so they had to do with the hardships of pioneer life. There were eight of a family, four sons and four daughters: Mrs. John Lackey, Toronto; Mrs. W. M. Clark, now of Markdale; Mrs. R. M. Cummings and Mrs. W. H. Mason of Rochester, N. Y.; Messrs. Wm. of Manitou, Man; John, deceased last February; Joshua of Euphrasia, and C. W. on the homestead. All who survive except William were present at the funeral. Thus the pioneers who laid the foundations for this progressive country are dropping out one by one until there is but here and there a land mark remaining.
