AUTHORITIES IN PANIC.

A despatch from St. Petersburg
says: "The strike is now
general here and the rioters are
growing in numbers and boldness.
Wednesday night a bomb was thrown
in Cathedral Place, killing its thrower
and a fund to defray the cost
of the funeral."

The authorities have made no attempt
to remove the body, the sailors having
threatened to burn the ship if any
attempt were made to interfere with it. A police
officer visiting the spot was killed by
triers.

RED FLAG.

During the day one of the torpedo

was set on fire by the crew, who then
abandoned the ship in the harbor, stopping at
the battleship's boats, and who then
dropped into the new mole, where
they evaded in semi-state all day

POTEMKIN REACHED BALTIMORE.

A despatch from St. Petersburg
says: "The mutiny has reached the
naval base at Libau, where the
army general, naval and
military bands, and
the town is in a state of
chaos. The rebels have
captured the town and
are holding it against all comers."

The authorities are panic-stricken, and
the Admiralty, consternation
reigned. Admiral Wirsching, chief of
the Naval General Staff, frankly con-
fessed that the situation was grave.

NIGHT OF HORROR.

A despatch from Odessa says: "The
mutineers of the Kniaz Potemkin Taxtavitchsky
have been joined by the
Kniaz Potemkin Taxtavitchsky, who
