FLESHERTON HAPPENINGS

At the ripe age of 84 years and five months Mr. David Wood, a respected resident of Armesia for nearly half a century, past away at his home in the east back line, near Flesherton. The funeral took place to Flesherton cemetery on Friday afternoon and the remains were interred beside those of his wife, who preceded him in death six years ago. Rev. Dr. Caldwell, assisted by Rev. J. B. Wass, conducted the burial service. The deceased was born in Enniskillen, County of Fermanagh, Ireland, on March 19, 1821. When quite young he entered the employ of his uncle, a merchant, with whom he remained fourteen years. In 1850 he emigrated to Canada, coming by way of New York to Toronto, where in February, 1852 he was married to Mrs. Mary Ann Graham, daughter of the late Mr. Johnston Little. In March 1856 he came to Armesia where he has since lived and made for himself and family a comfortable home. The deceased for the past two years enjoyed second sight and could read comfortably the finest print without glasses. Being a great reader he was well informed and had laudable ambitions for the education of his children several of whom having graduated the teaching profession. In religion he was a life long Methodist, for many years a member of the church at Flesherton, and so lived that his end was peace. Mr. Wood was the father of ten children; five of whom survive him as follows: J. L. Wood, teacher at Ceylon; Mrs. D. B. Brown, Orangeville; Mrs. A. J. Magee, near Eugenia; Mrs. A. J. Howard, Euphrasia; and Miss M. E. Wood, at home. Two brothers also survive him, Robert in the Old Land, and John, in Peterborough. His brother Archibald, banker at Millbrook, died a year ago.

A death which has caused profound sympathy in the community for the bereaved parents was that of Mary Lillian, the bright little eleven-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Down, of the 4th line, who died on Friday last, ill with appendicitis, but was improving and good hopes entertained for her recovery till Thursday evening, when she suddenly relapsed and rapidly sank till the end came. The funeral took place to the public cemetery here on Sunday afternoon and was largely attended by sympathizing friends. Rev. Dr. Caldwell conducted the funeral service. The Methodist Sabbath School here marched in a body to the grave and after viewing the remains as they were conveyed to the tomb, sang "Safe in the arms of Jesus." The coffin was covered with floral tributes, among them being a beautiful wreath from the scholars at Portlaw day school, who thus showed their love for their little companion so suddenly called away. We join in the universal sympathy expressed for the grief-stricken parents.

Recent Happenings Around the Hub Concisely Reported.
Evangelists Crossley and Hunter opened a series of meetings last Sunday in Walkerton. Menford has dispensed with the services of a tax collector this year. The rates are to be collected by Molpina Bank free of charge, on the installment plan, coming due the first Monday in October and the first Monday in November. His Honor Judge Morrison was tendered many very complimentary addresses by Owen Saunders and presented with a handsome cabinet of silverware with monogram on each article and an inscription on the cabinet, also a solid gold chain and pocket. The Judge and his family leave on Thursday for their new home in Picton. On Wednesday night of last week the C. P. R. got in some sharp work at Guelph. By moonlight they constructed and laid a crossing over the Grand Trunk at Goldie's Mills for their Guelph and Goderich branch. The G.T.R. had refused to grant a crossing, but by daylight Thursday morning the C. P. R. had their construction train over. At an important meeting in Toronto of the Independent Telephone Companies of Ontario resolutions declaring in favor of Government ownership of trunk lines and requesting the Government to pass legislation compelling the railroad companies to grant the independent lines entrance to their stations free and necessary access to their property upon equitable terms, were passed. A resolution calling upon all municipalities to refuse exclusive franchises also found favor, and the Dominion Government was telegraphed for its action in opening a telephone inquiry.
