A Modern Barn.

Planting Large Shade Trees

The committee appointed to examine con. 2 w T.S.R. over lake reported, estimating cost of bridge to \$250.00, but making no recommendation.

Mr. Greenaway was authorized to receive and expend all moneys subscribed or granted for sidewalks in Holland Centre.

Money orders were granted amounting in all to \$449.92.
