Queen's University opened her sixtyfifth session recently in arts, science and medicine. The prospects are, bright for the attendance passing the housand mark. Ten years ago the students numbered 533; last, session there were 957. Although under the Presbyterian Church, less than half the students belong to that body, as shown by an analysis of the attendance for 904-5, as given out. The religious peliefs were: Presbyterians, 474; Methodists, 243; Anglicans, Roman Catholics, 60; Congregationalists, 19; Baptists, 14; others, 27.

The Illinois Central is using s mechanical weed burner to destroy the growth of weed along the right of way. 
