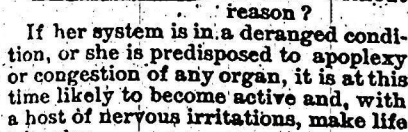

House of Refuge Notes.

(By an Inmate.)

John McIntyre, referred to in last week's report as rapidly sinking, passed quietly away at 2:15 a.m. on Wednesday of last week. He had been a patient and intense sufferer during the month that he was here; his death was a happy release to himself and a relief to those who attended him, and too much praise cannot be bestowed on them for their zealous care in so anxious a duty towards their suffering, dying comrade; if he was left uncaared for by relatives, his comrades were friends to the last. May they get their reward. The Rev. J. S. I. Wilson read the burial service at the Home in the presence of the assembled male inmates prior to the removal of the remains to Markdale cemetery on Thursday morning. It was sad to witness the lone remains borne to its last resting place without a friend or relative being present to pay the last tribute of respect to one who had spent his home, his all, in the care of a tender and loving wife who predeceased him some years ago; left alone, uncaared for, almost entirely unrecognized by friends or relatives. We trust he has received a glorious reward and joined to his dear departed partner in life, in a land where there is no more suffering, no more sorrow, and no more parting. A couple of distant relatives, came on Thursday with the intention (we believe) of attending the funeral, but were too late.

The sudden change in the weather last week stopped for a time the raising of the root crops on this place and which were turning out beyond expectations. Beets and mangolds are exceptionally good. Mr. Harness showed your spruce a couple of mammoth sugar beets; the following are their dimensions:

Quite a number are nearly as large, and we were informed later that a few had been raised that are even larger. This speaks well for the management of the agricultural department of the County Industrial Farm; we have yet to hear better in this part of the terrestrial sphere.

Speaking of the recent sudden climatic change reminds one of the effect it has had on some of our old fellows, intensifying their love for, and causing them to hug felicitously the radiator. In no one is this affectionate desire more palpable than in old D. His manseping is long and strong, when once wound up, takes a long time to run down; his hoarsers are by one sea-level in the land of nod and the old fellow keeps clattering away to his stout walking stick and a well-worn newspaper reporter, until the main spring becomes weak and the gabbling simmers down to a faint truant.

On Sunday last Divine service was jointly conducted by Mr. Harness and Mr. Ennis of Markdale. Mr. H. took an abstract text for a sermon, but in his usual able manner delivered a most forceful and appropriate discourse from the 78th Psalm. Forceful, inasmuch that he faithfully delineated the murmuring, discontentedness and disobedience of the Israelites in their journey through the wilderness, and comparing the same with the murmuring and discontented Israelites of our present day; appropriate, because it was justly applicable to some who have been and to some who are now dependants under his charge and it is to be hoped that the discourse will be remembered by all and be efficacious in those to whom it is applicable. Owing probably to the inclemency of the weather, the congregation was not so large as on former occasions, the fervency, however, was none the less as evidenced by the after meeting under the charge of Mr. Ennis. Mrs. Simmond sang a hymn, accompanying herself on the accordion; Miss Smith presided at the organ all through the service; for a young person Miss S. is an efficient organist, playing with excellent smoothness and cadence. It is a pity there is no vocal talent among the inmates, even a quartette would materialize when outside assistance is scarce, but then, musical talent is very prominent in old folks like "Us"; the singing on Sunday was, however, very good, and the service altogether most enjoyable, and we trust, profitable.

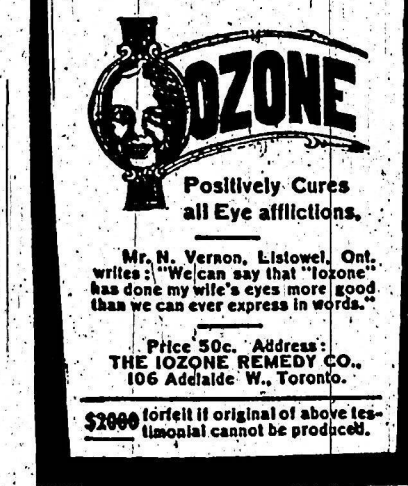
