### NOTES.

Alberta's first election as a province takes place the 9th November—King Edward's birthday.

Mr. John McDonald of Chatsworth has sent in to the Provincial Secretary his resignation as clerk of the Division Court here with the request that it be accepted as soon as convenient. He says he finds that the office is unprofitable to him in his present position as manager of the Merchants Bank here. He has been clerk for 20 years. He says there was a time when the office was worth \$700 a year, but of late years the fees have not averaged \$50, which may be taken as an indication of the general prosperity of the county as well as of the neighboring good conduct of the community served by the Court. In the old times there were continual wrangles about line fences, damages to crops, trespass, horse trading, sheep killing by dogs and all that class of cases known as torts, but these have now nearly all disappeared, and instead of a packed court room and big fights between the lawyers it is rare to see more than a dozen people present. There has been a similar falling of in the Division Court business all over the Province.—News.

Sir Frederick Borden, Minister of Militia, has advocated two very sensible reforms in the past few weeks. He favors elementary drill and physical exercise in the public schools and some sort of universal uniform for all branches of the Canadian militia. These are two eminently wise and rational plans. The teaching of elementary drill to the boys and girls of Canada is sure to result in mental, moral and physical good. It will make them more keen in thought, more amenable to discipline and more erect and healthy in body. If such a result is not beneficial experience is a false teacher. Sir Frederick's other scheme to introduce a universal uniform is admirable. At present there is a fearful and wonderful combination of uniforms in the Canadian militia. Why should not the uniform of militiamen in Canada be what the word means—a uniform? Not long ago the Minister of Militia told a Toronto newspaper that the matter was considered and approved by high militia officers and that it was likely that a serviceable khaki uniform would be introduced some day. Militiamen will hail it with delight when it comes.

Dwellers in city and country alike have, or should have, a lively interest in the investigation which the Department of Agriculture is just beginning with a view to determining the best type of barns for dairy cows. The importance to cities and individuals of the purity and healthfulness of the milk supply is obvious, yet the great mass of the urban population is still, in spite of official inspection, largely at the mercy of chance, so far as the thoroughly hygienic qualities of that supply are concerned. With the best intentions, many owners of dairy herds still house their stock in ill-ventilated and ill-constructed stables, with a naive disregard of the principles of sanitation. Now that the scientists are again raising the question whether bovine tuberculosis is not, after all, communicable to man, the health of milk cows becomes, even more than formerly, a point of prime importance. Model dairy farms in various parts of the country exhibit ideal conditions, but these conditions are frequently attained only at an expense so great as to put them beyond the reach of the ordinary farmer. The Secretary's evident purpose is to gather such data of the plans and construction of suitable buildings as will enable the average dairyman to avail himself of them with profit—to himself and his customers.

A chaplain of the English navy was giving a stereoscopic lecture on the subject, "Scenes from the Bible." ### DISTRESSING CASE OF CONSUMPTION.

Four of One Family Pass Away—Last Daughter Now Ill.

A Toronto clergyman tells of a family in his congregation, which consisted of the mother and five children—the father being dead—four of whom in a few years have fallen victims to consumption and died. And now the fifth, a daughter, who is employed in the office of a wholesaler, and who has been the one source of support to the mother, is obliged to leave her work, realizing that she also—mainly, it is believed, as a result of nursing her brothers and sisters—has contracted this dread disease. Kind friends are interesting themselves in the case, but the difficulty met with is to send her to a place where the proper care and treatment will be given.

It is for such cases as this—and there is hardly a clergyman in any city who is not constantly meeting such appeals,—that the new Free Consumptive Hospital, under the auspices of the National Sanitarium Association, is being built. The people of Canada as a whole must feel grateful to Mr. W. T. Figg and the exco. of the late Har. A. Hays, who by their own funds have erected this building. But before it can be occupied it must be furnished with beds and other proper furnishings and appointments. The National Sanitarium Association, already carrying a heavy debt, are not able to furnish the new building so generously placed at their disposal, and are appealing to the people of the Dominion for \$10,000 for this purpose.

It does not need the suggestion that this is the most pressing of all charities at this time, for the public are fully aware of the widespread character of consumption, and also to the fact, as demonstrated by the best medical authorities, that when this disease is taken hold of in its early stages it, as much as any other disease, is curable. The new hospital, just so soon as the money is raised to complete the furnishings, will be ready to receive fifty patients, free of charge—even their railway fare will not be a tax upon them.

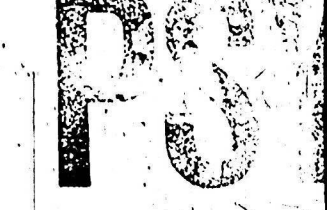
