SAD SHOOTING FATALITY.

George Walker Accidentally Discharged Gun While Coon Hunting and Was Killed.

A sad shooting accident occurred on Tuesday afternoon, near Berkeley, when Mr. George Walker, who lives a mile and a half east of Berkeley, son of William Walker, Berkeley west, lost his life. In company with his brotherin-law and father he was coon hunting, and having treed one, George climbed upon a fallen tree or log and was pointing upwards with one hand, indicating the position of the coon in the tree; in the other hand he held his gun. While in this position he allowed the butt of the gun to rest on the ground, but in doing so it is supposed that the trigger caught on a twig; which discharged the gun, the full charge entering the young man's side, and he died within fifteen minutes after the accident. The coroner was summoned, but it is not likely an inquest will be held.
