TEMPERANCE IN ENGLAND.

Evils Which Churches Should Combine Against.

Interviewed concerning the national claims on the Anglican Church of England, William Tallich, formerly Secretary of the Howard Association, said:

"There has seldom been a period when matters of the utmost national importance more needed than at present the united and energetic action of all Churches, and especially of that body which enjoys the peculiar qualifications, privileges, and prestige of the Establishment. The crisis of the multitudinous ranks of the unemployed are waxing louder and louder amongst us, the burden of pauperism and of official extravagance in relation to it is becoming more and more oppressive, and meanwhile politicians are resorting to denuding evils by merely palliative and temporary means. One of the principles of such preventive measures—namely, the effectual promotion of temperance—is still regarded with an immense apathy and aloofness. Gambling has assumed wilfully mischievous extent. Thousands of excellent citizens are being used or imprisoned for conscience sake, owing to the unconstitutional framing of a recent Act of Parliament. The attendance of places of worship is limited to a very small percentage of the general population. The observance of Sunday seems to be vanishing quantity, both amongst the rich and the poor. And notwithstanding a very striking and world-wide increase of resort to international arbitration for the settlement of minor disputes, the still continuing growth of enormous armaments, together with the burden of conscription abroad, has become a plague to all countries, including our own."

A memorial tablet has been erected on No. 14 Doughty street, London, W.C., where Sir John Lubbock resided from 1883 to 1906.
