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CUBA'S THINGS HAPPENING.

The Moscow correspondent of the London Times cables:—Considerable progress has been made among the workmen. They have just witnessed the destruction of warehouses, the owner of which defied the injunction as to the removal of arms. The newsboys have gathered in the printing offices of The Pochta because they refused to lower the prices. Several hundred workmen are parading, the standards being brooms and banners, the cooks and housemaids joining them as a protest against the private registry offices of the employers. The windows of the houses are nearly all barricaded.

THEY INSIST UPON POLITICAL ASSASSIN.

A London news agency despatch from St. Petersburg says it is officially announced that the Lithuanians, who exceed 2,000,000, will be formed into a distinct autonomous administrative unit, with an Assembly elected by direct universal suffrage. This body will sit at Vilna, the ancient capital of Lithuania.

LIBERTY OF PRESS.

A despatch from St. Petersburg says: The Emperor presided at the first meeting of Count Witte's full Cabinet at Tsarskoe-Selo on Wednesday. It is understood that he signed two decrees, converting the promises of the manifesto of liberty of the press and of assembly into definite orders.

PRAYED AS DEATH CAME

Extraordinary Suicide of a Girl in New York.

A New York despatch says: Mary McCarthy to-day knelt and prayed on the tracks of the Ninth Avenue Elevated Railroad, while the train in front of which she had leaped with the purpose of ending her life bore down upon her too close to be stopped by its motorman. The girl entered the station at 66th street and Columbus avenue; and after passing the ticket-taker she attracted attention by several irresolute little runs toward the edge of the platform. Each time she stopped, apparently unable to bring herself to take the final step. Finally when a train was half a block away the girl, who then was at the extreme end of the platform, threw herself on the track. Although at first she fell prostrate Miss McCarthy hurriedly rose to her knees and before the first car struck her she had raised her arms and clasped her hands in an attitude of prayer. She was killed almost instantly.

RUSSIA LOST 55,000 MEN.

Two Men Killed in Battle to Each Victim of Sickness.

A Washington despatch says: Col. Van P. Hoff, Medical Department, U. S. A., who has recently returned from the Russian army in Manchuria with which he went through part of the campaign in the war against Japan, has been authorized by the chief of staff to give out extracts of his official report. According to Col. Hoff, the number of killed and dead of wounds was 37,642 men, and the number of men dead from disease 18,330. These statistics are exclusive of casualties at Port Arthur, and show almost exactly two men dead from results of battle to one man dead from sickness.

LEADING MARKETS

BREADSTUFFS.

Toronto, Nov. 28.—Wheat—Ontario—No. 2 white 80c. outside, red, of mixed, 1c less. Goose is in good demand to fill sales made earlier in the season, at 75c to 76c; spring sells at the same price. Wheat—Manitoba—Prices at lake ports are easier, No. 1 northern being quoted at 85c, and No. 2 at 83c.

Flour—Ontario—Exporters' bid points, buyers bags, at outside points; holders ask \$2.20 to \$3.25. Blends for domestic consumption sell at \$3.50 to \$3.60 to \$4.50 to \$4.80 for second patents, and \$4.20 to \$4.30 for bakers.

Milled—Ontario—Bran, in car lots, \$1.25 to \$1.35, at outside points; shorts, \$1.65 to \$1.80 for bran and \$1.85 to \$1.90 for shorts, at Toronto and equal freight points.

Oats—Firm at 36c to 37c for No. 2 at outside points. Barley—No. 2 52c to 53c, No. 3 extra 51c to 52c, No. 4 47c to 48c.

Rolled Oats—\$5.25 for barrels and \$5 for bags, on track here; 25¢ more for broken lots here and 40¢ outside.
