By-Law No. 110

To Abolish Statute Labor in the Township of Euphrasia.

PREAMBLE
 WHEREAS the highways of this Municipality have been maintained by Statute Labor performed by the ratepayers and other persons from the township levied to meet the expenditure connected therewith;
 AND WHEREAS for several years an agitation has been gaining strength to have Statute Labor abolished, and the highways repaired and maintained by a levy on the ratepayers of the township which when supplemented by the grant from the provincial funds shall be sufficient to meet the requirements thereof;

AND WHEREAS a majority of the ratepayers, voting on a plebiscite for the purpose of ascertaining the wishes of the ratepayers, have expressed their approval of the said change;
 THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Township of Euphrasia, and it is hereby enacted as follows:
 I. From and after the passing of this By-Law all Statute Labor to which any person (resident or non-resident) may be liable in this Municipality shall be abolished.
 II. Every male person over the age of twenty-one years and under the age of sixty, not otherwise exempted and not exempt from the performance of Statute Labor, shall pay the sum of one dollar to the Municipal Council as a contribution towards the maintenance and repair of the highways of the township in proportion to the value of his real property in the township, and in case any person who does not comply with the provisions of this section shall be liable to the same proportion of the sum as shall be payable to the Municipal Council by the ratepayers of the township, and the sum so paid shall be applied to the maintenance and repair of the highways of the township in proportion to the value of his real property, which has been used for that purpose.

III. A sum of money shall be levied rateably by the Council each year on all the assessable property in the township, and the sum so levied shall in the discretion of the Council, be applied to the maintenance and repair of the highways of the township in proportion to the value of his real property, and the sum so levied shall be applied to the maintenance and repair of the highways of the township in proportion to the value of his real property, which has been used for that purpose.
 IV. All expenditure for road material, tools or machinery, or for jobs or contracts similar to what have hitherto been met out of the general funds of the Municipality shall continue to be met from the same source as heretofore, which shall be expended by the Council or commissioners as directed by the Council.
 V. That the Council shall appoint one or more overseers, who shall be styled Road Commissioners, and who shall be authorized to carry out the provisions of this by-law.
 (1) To acquire himself with the best and most modern methods of contracting and maintaining roads, and of advantageously operating the tools and instruments with which the roads are to be constructed.
 (2) To employ, direct and discharge all men and teams he may require, to carry out his work.
 (3) To begin the annual labor as early in the work as the weather and the condition of the roads will permit, and work continuously until the appropriation for his division for the year is exhausted.
 (4) To plane or scrape any of the roads in his division whenever in his judgment they may require it.
 (5) To keep the bridges, sluices and ditches in his jurisdiction open and in repair, and the highways free from obstructions at all times.
 (6) To properly protect by railing or otherwise, any excavation or other work on any other places dangerous to travel.
 (7) To see that the loadings of the act to prevent the spreading of thistles and noxious weeds upon the highways and road allowance carried out.
 (8) To cause the roads within his division that are used by the public in the Township of Euphrasia to be meted and kept open during the season of sleighing each year.
 (9) To see that the roads within his division are kept open and in repair, and the highways free from obstructions at all times.
 (10) To perform such other services as may be required of him from time to time under the direction of the Council.

Each commissioner shall keep an accurate record of the men employed and the work done by him under the provisions of this by-law, and shall submit the same to the Council at intervals as his instructions may require. Any commissioner who fails to comply with these provisions shall be liable to the same proportion of the sum as shall be payable to the Municipal Council by the ratepayers of the township, and the sum so levied shall be applied to the maintenance and repair of the highways of the township in proportion to the value of his real property, which has been used for that purpose.
 VI. This By-Law shall be in force from the date of its passing, and shall remain in force until it is repealed or amended by the Council.
 Passed in open council this 10th day of November 1904.
