To Abolish Statute Labor in the Township of Euphrasia.

PREAMBLE

WHEREAS the highways of this Municipality have been maintained by Statute Labor performed taereds, supplemented by sufficient grants from the township levies to meet all the expenditure connected therewith;

AND WHEREAS for several years an agitation has been gaining strength to have Statute Labor abolished, and the highways repaired and maintained by a levy on the assessable lends of the township which when supplemented by grant from the general township funds shall be sufficient to meet the requirements thereof:

AND WHEREAS a majority of the rate-payers, voting on a plebiscite for the purpose of ascertaining the wishes of the ratepayers have expressed their approval of the said have expressed their approval of the said change:

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Township of Euphrasia, and it is hereby enacted as follows:

1º Upon, from and after the passing of this By-Law all statute hibor to which any person tresident or non-resident) may be liable in this municipality shall be abolished.

II. Every male person over the age of twenty-one years and under the age of sixty not otherwise assessed and not exempt from
