

MR. THOMAS KELLS DEAD

Passed Suddenly Away on Friday Morning Last - Funeral on

Sunday Largely Attended. A sudden gloom was cast over the village last Friday morning, when it became known that the spirit of Mr. Thos. Kells, a highly respected citizen, had passed the border of earthly existance. Mr. Kells was born in County Armagh, Ireland, and came to this country at the age of 21 in the early fifties. He settled at Port Hope, and was there married to Miss Sarah Ann Dean. Two sons, Robert and Wm Thomas of Maple Creek, Assa., and four daughters, Mrs. P. Fliut, Toronto; Mrs. Jas. McMullen, Ceylon; Mrs. Henry Sparling, Dornoch; and Sarah Ann, who with her mother died shortly after moving to this part. In 1853 he settled on lot 15, con, 18, Artemesia, In 1864 he married Mary Ann Glassford, who survives him. In this marriage, one son and six daughters, viz: W. Glass ford Kells, of Maple Creek, Assa.; Mrs. Wm. McCallum, Calgary; Mrs. A. W. Sheldon, Maple Creek; Mrs. (Rev.) P. Cameron, Owen Sound; Mrs. A. S. Henry, Mission City, B. C.; Mrs. A.E. Myles, Kimberley; and Miss Edna, at home. Mr. Kells was one of our earliest pioneers. It was through him and Mr. William Leckie, a former reeve of Artemesia, that the old Toronto. County of Grey v. Village of Markdale.-Indgment (R.) in action tried without a jury at Owen Sound. Action to enforce a by-law of defendants. Held; that, under the authorities, the by-law in question is one clearly withn sec. 28), sub-sec. 1, of the municipal act, which section requires that every by-law for raising money upon the credit of the municipality, not required for its ordinary expenditure and not payable within the same municipal year, shall be submitted to the electors of the municipality. This was not done in the present case. The by-law assumes to create a liability or debt on the village for ten years from the installation or the first supplying; of electric current. 
