FLESHERTON HAPPENINGS

Our citizens received a rude awakening at one o'clock on Saturday morning last when the Methodist church bell rang the fire alarm. The two-story section of Mr. M. K. Richardson's brick block, which contained Wesley Lyons' harness shop, the Standard bank, W. J. Bellamy's conveyancing office and an unoccupied residence on the upper flat, was the scene of the conflagration which soon lit up the sky and in a couple of hours' time had done its devastating work. The blaze started from some unknown cause in the harness shop and when discovered had made such headway that nothing in the shop could be saved. In the bank; all loose books and papers were removed, but two heavy safes with their contents went through the fire safely. The contents of Mr. Bellamy's office including the safe were removed. The heavy fire wall in the big store occupied by Boyd, Hickling & Co., stood the test well, but it was with most heroic work that that part of the block was saved. Mr. R. J. Spronle's block across the street was in jeopardy at times. The men worked with the skill of a trained brigade and with the village fire appliances kept a stream of water playing on the flames and adjoining buildings. The little hand engine on this as in former occasions proved itself a valuable asset of the village. Mr. Richardson carried \$4,000 insurance, but the proportion of the section destroyed we have not learned. Mr. Lyons, we learn had \$800 insurance on stock. Considerable damage was done to Boyd, Hickling & Co.'s stock by smoke and removal, but insured to cover. The bank has opened in Sproule's block. House of Refuge Notes.

A happy and prosp. is New Year. It was with mingled feelings of deep regret and surprise that we learned of the death of Mr. Thos. Kells, on Saturday last. For nearly forty years deceased gentleman had been personally known to your correspondent, who for many years had considered him one of the many of his highly esteemed friends. We extend our heart-felt sympathy to the bereaved family. Mr. Harness attended the funeral of the late Mr. T. Kells on Sunday. The deceased was an old-time friend and associate at the County Council board with Mr. H. Owing to the absence of Mr. Harness on Sunday afternoon, the divine service at the Home was conducted by one of the male inmates. Mrs. Simmonds presided at the organ. Previous to singing the last hymn and pronouncing the benediction, a short fellowship meeting was held and a short, kindly address, appropriate to the old and new year was delivered to the comrades by the conductor of the meeting. The congregation was small, but the meeting was, nevertheless, pleasant and appreciable. On Monday afternoon the Rev. J. S. I. Wilson, accompanied by his father, visited the Home and prayed and sang with the inmates. It was a truly beautiful spectacle to see those two Rev. gentlemen, the venerable but noble looking parent and the youthful looking son so cordially shaking hands and freely conversing with the poor old inmates, irrespective of class or denomination. They could not fail to leave an impression on all present too favorable to be readily effaced. On Monday evening the old inmates, male and female, met in the men's day room for a New Year's greeting. After tea the Matron brought as many of the old ladies as were able to the men's day room, where for a couple of hours any who could make any attempt at singing rendered a little ditty of some sort, even the ex-hospital sergeant, who it is a difficult matter to get to do anything in the line of exertion, gave an Irish come all ye in his own native style to the best of his ability. Of course Mrs. Simmonds was the star of the evening, but tailor Morris can be humorous when he takes the notion. Following is a statement of the institution as regards inmates admitted, discharged, etc., during 1905: Number of inmates admitted during the past year were, men 16; women 10; total 26. Discharged, men 10; women 9; total 19. Of this number three men were re-admitted. Deaths, 7 men, 5 women, or an average of one a month. In the home on the 1st January, 1906, men 32, women 11, total 53. Chargeable to the county 31. One man and one woman are pay inmates. There is one married couple chg. inmates. The average age of inmates as near as we can ascertain, is, men 70, women 72. The oldest male inmate is Chris Yanetta, 89 years; the youngest H. Tamblin, 47. The oldest female is Mrs. Saunders, 88 years; the youngest, Fanny Holman, about 60. Denominations: Church of England, 16; Presbyterians, 3; Methodists, 9; Baptists, 4; Disciples, 1; Roman Catholics, 1. Total 33. One man and one woman are afflicted with locomotor ataxia; one man and two women, total blindness; several of both sexes, through age and infirmity, are totally incapacitated from labor of any kind; four or five cripples, but otherwise fairly hearty, a couple of whom are able to do odd light jobs; and three or four though well advanced in years are still comparatively vigorous and healthy and able to render some assistance about the place. Stock: There are two working horses, 5 milch cows, 2 calves, 10 young pigs and about 40 hens. On Tuesday the manager received an anonymous communication through the Markdale post office, asking if the surplus literature of this institution could not be distributed amongst the poor in and around Markdale. If the writer would kindly send a signed communication, or apply personally to the manager, he would take great pleasure in exchanging views with the applicant on that subject.
