Liquor License Law.

The following resolution was unanimously passed by the Presbytery of Owen Sound at its meeting last week, on motion made by Dr. Fraser:

The Presbytery of Owen Sound, representing a large and intelligent constituency while considering that Turner & Co., account for medicine for the bill now before the Legislature to amend the Liquor License Laws, contains a number of clauses favorable to temperance, is opposed to requiring a three-fifths majority for the passing company, invoice for road grader; of a local option by-law, to shortening clair account for repair of a bridge on two, to issuing licenses on boats and the term of trial from three years to sideroad 50; from Local Board of trains and to allowing sale of liquor to Health, several accounts for services guests in hotels on Sundays, as not called for or warranted by any general expression of public opinion. The Presbytery believes that the


