### NOTES.

The growth of the temperance movement in the British army is very marked. King Edward, who has done so much towards the cause throughout the empire, is at the head of the Royal Army Temperance Association, which possesses a membership of some 48,000 soldiers. In the navy the movement is strong also and good results are reported.

The cigarette fiend is being hit hard upon all sides in the business world. The Chicago, Burlington and Quincy Railway company has announced that every employee found smoking cigarettes that the company will no longer give him employment. They ascertained their satisfaction that the cigarette fiend cannot, or does not, perform his duties in a satisfactory manner as does the other fellow. This is poor encouragement for our boys.

Our citizens deserve credit for the pride they take in our school. We venture the assertion that no student went forth from our little town, but went away with the best wishes of our people; they gave him encouragement during school life and when he departed took him by the hand and said, "God speed thee." Not one who has finished the course in our school, wherever he may be, but wishes our town and her people well, for it was among our Christian people, surrounded by an influence that was elevating and noble, animated by the splendid example of our citizens that he received the foundation that makes him to-day the upright citizen in any community in which he may live.

The Methodists of British Columbia propose to erect a memorial church to celebrate the jubilee year of Dr. Robson, a pioneer of the Methodist ministry, to whom British Columbia is indebted beyond calculation. Dr. Robson is one of those hardy church pioneers who keep alongside of the trader and prospector of the fringe of civilization and who unquestionably exercised a good influence over their rough associates. In the days before over the railway penetrated the majestic mountain ranges of British Columbia, Dr. Robson was toiling among the Indians and miners. Later on with the railway came hordes of restless and unbridled adventurers, a wild and lawless lot. Among them Dr. Robson labored without ceasing. When everybody else was seeking money Dr. Robson was trying to make his fellow-men better. The proposal to erect a memorial church to such a man is an admirable one in every way.

We are not given to boasting, but we are proud of the farmer boys of this vicinity. They are with rare exception, a healthy, intelligent and happy class of young men. We feel like taking our hat clear off when we meet them, upon our streets, and no class is more welcomed to our office. Too many boys leave the farm where they would have made substantial and good citizens, and go to the city where only one in a thousand succeeds in life's battle. There are farmers who fairly drive their boys away. There is no excuse for this. The farmer boy is entitled to his vacations, to several relaxations, his visit to the city, good books, magazines and his home paper. To the observing one it is plain to be seen that the old farm is the best place in the world for the average young man and never fails to bring a happier and more useful life than the city. Young men, you who till the soil and earn your bread by the sweat of your brow, we are proud of you; our latrine is always out to you and you will always have a friend in this paper. Come and see us and give us the news from your neighborhood.

There is one kind of money which is really "tainted," and against which there is on that account a general and well founded prejudice. That is the paper currency which is not morally, but materially tainted, through long use, mth handling and storage in a variety of places of more or less uncleanness. We do not know that anybody ever positively refuses to accept such money, though it is always in order to protest against a bill that is too tattered and reeking for respectability. We are not convinced either, that everybody who accepts a worn and soiled bill is in imminent danger of dying forthwith with a complication of tetanus, tuberculosis, appendicitis and bubonic plague, though we have no doubt that diseases are occasionally conveyed through such a medium. But from the point of view of health, of cleanliness, of decency and of the looks of the thing, there ought to be a reform of our currency. The credit of the country requires that our circulating medium shall be such that nobody will feel that it should be handled with tongs. It is best that our money is always and everywhere worth its full face value. We ought also to be able to boast that it is kept as clean, physically, as it is possible to do. Dirty money is not so bad as a depreciated money, but it is too bad for a self-respecting nation to use.

## Artemesia Court of Revision

The council of Artemesia met on Saturday, June 2nd, 1906, as a Court of Revision on Assessment Roll of 1906. The members were all present, and each signed and made the required oath as members of said Court, when fourteen appeals were disposed of as follows:

Wm. Carter, assessment reduced \$100; A. C. H. Munshay, roll sustained; S. R. Butler, roll sustained; P. Bolger, assessment reduced \$75; A. S. Irving, roll sustained; T. J. Stinson, roll sustained; Jas. Finlay, assessment reduced \$100, lots 39 and 40, con. 12; W. W. Trimble, business assessment struck off; J. F. Mathewson, assessment reduced \$100; W. J. Bowes, business assessment struck off; Geo. Swanton, roll sustained, lots 133 and 134, 1 S.W.T. & S.R.; J. T. O'Brien, assessment reduced \$100 on lot 31, con. 14; John Snell, roll sustained on butter factory; Wesley Buskin, roll sustained.

McKenzie—Best—That the assessment roll as finally passed by this Court of Revision be the roll for all purposes and be binding on all persons except as in so far as the same may be further amended by Appeals to the Judge of the County Court of the County of Grey.—Carried.

After the Court of Revision the Municipal Council of the Township of Artemesia met in the town hall, Flesherton, on Saturday, the 2nd day of June, 1906. The members were all present, the reeve in the chair. The minutes of Session of May 5, 1906, were read and confirmed. The following communications were presented and read: Joseph Ferris, notice of bridge on south line being out of repair; H. Walton, notice that bridge on Town Line Artemesia and Euphrasia is out of repair; the reeve reported on condition of Valley Road, recommending the expenditure of \$150 from Louck's mill to about A. Graham's; the reeve and Mr. Whyte reported as to opening up 30 sideroad north from Durham Road, recommending that no action be taken at present.

McKenzie—Best—That the clerk advertise the closing of road allowance between lots 25 and 26, con. 11, and that a by-law be prepared and be passed for the purpose in the proper way.

McKenzie—Best—That all parties having wood or other obstructions on Townline Artemesia and Osprey between 3 and 4 lines be notified to remove them forthwith.—Carried.

Best—White—That Messrs. McKenzie and McLoughry be appointed to confer with Robert Campbell in reference to removing fence from road on pt. lot 24, con. 13.—Carried.

Best—McLoughry—That \$150 be expended on the Valley Road from Louck's mill to near Campbell's road, and that the reeve is hereby appointed to attend to the same.—Carried.

McKenzie—Whyte—That the reeve and the mover are appointed to examine bridge on concession 14, at lot 28 and take such action conjointly with the Euphrasia council as shall be deemed necessary.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That the report of the reeve and Mr. Whyte re 30 sideroad, con. 1, N.D.R., be received and that no action be taken in the matter at present.—Carried.

Best—Whyte—That A. McCabe be refunded \$3.00 paid in taxes of 1906 as statute labor, the same having been charged in error.—Carried.

McLoughry—Best—That the clerk's postage account to date, \$8.55, be paid.—Carried.

McKenzie—McLoughry—That the assessor, having returned his Roll for 1906, be paid his salary, \$90, as provided by by-law.—Carried.

Best—McLoughry—That the reeve be paid \$4.00 for services on Committee re 30 sideroad and Valley road, and Mr. Whyte be paid \$2.00 for services on committee re 30 sideroad.—Carried.

Council adjourned.—Advance.
