Mr. Adams, of Warton, was a guest at the mass this week.

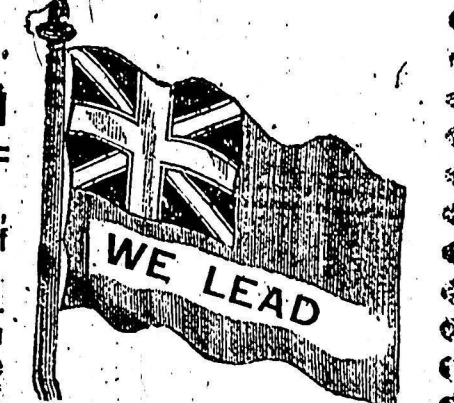
Mr. Herman and Miss Lottie Thompson, and Miss Barry, of Woodford, visited at Mr. Thos. Campbell's on Saturday.

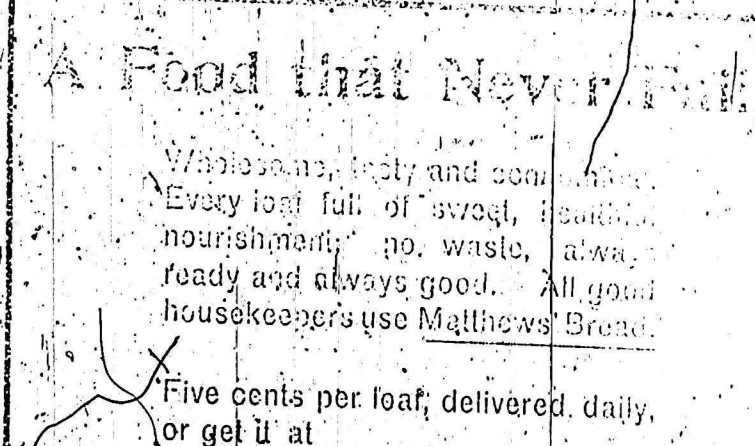
