## Continuation Classes.

Editor STANDARD—Secondary education is the key to the future. The nation that is going to develop and prosper is going to do so in the seats of the mighty and to hold the balance of power. Whether in commerce, in farming or in war, success does not lie in means of transportation, or excellent machinery, or superior battleships, but in intelligence and manhood. Everything depends, not in the gun, but in the man behind the gun. The chief business of Canada is not to develop her mines, but her manhood. The educational question is the greatest that concerns us. It is a matter of patriotism. The children belong to the State. They constitute the greatest asset a country possesses. We can afford to economize in everything else, but not in this. We can with impunity neglect other things if we give this the first place.

We beg to differ from the old adage and its reverent admirers, "Godliness is not next to Godliness"—it is education. Education is the magic eye which dispels the darkness of ignorance and failure, and will place the children of Canada in a position where success is easy and more certain.

The government is only waiting for some encouraging response from the people who constitute the real rulers—to give us advanced legislation in educational matters.

What we have been saying refers primarily to Secondary Education, and this law can be brought to our very doors in the form of Continuation Classes. Continuation classes of Grades A, B, and C, as good as a High School, and they are going to receive a great impetus throughout Ontario within the next few years, unless our "penny wise and pound foolish" policy is to be insisted.

This provision for these classes will not mean any serious extra burden to the ratepayer, and they are now being successfully carried out in several places. In order to place them upon a successful and permanent basis, it will be necessary for the county council to give a much larger grant. The High Schools are generously supplied by the county, and it is hardly fair for the ratepayers to pay for High Schools in Owen Sound and Meaford and bear the extra burden of continuation classes in their own municipalities.

A High School at the south of the county would not meet the situation. The best thing would be to give an extra grant and have continuation classes in every centre of population in the county of Grey, whether rural or urban, and this would place secondary education within reach of 80 per cent of the scholars of the county. This would mean that the children who are now deprived from the inalienable privilege of a High School education can, without leaving the protecting care of home, qualify for the teaching profession, the university, the dental college, pharmacy, etc. No greater privilege has ever been devised for the benefit of
