

## Golden Wedding.

On Saturday, February 9th, at their home in Thorburn, Mr. and Mrs. Neil McCollum, in the presence of about 20 of their most intimate friends, celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their happy wedding day. The happy old couple were showered with congratulations, and presented with a number of gold and silver articles in the form of tableware and jewelry, besides a little box of gold coins, which came by express from Syracuse, New York. Fifty of his fifty years of married life were spent in public service as councillor, reeve and county councillor, besides a term in the provincial house at Toronto, as member for East Grey.

Mr. McCollum was in 1855 married to Miss Martha Green, of the township of Vaughan, York County, the pretty little village of Bolton, in York County, by the Rev. Mr. Lacey, then the pastor of the Primitive Methodist Church of that place.

Ten children resulted from the happy union, five of which survive, viz: Mr. Neil of Alberta; Mr. Peter A. and Mrs. W. Whitfield, of Syracuse; Mr. David, of Dakota, who was fortunately able to be present; and Mrs. Philip White, of the 3rd line, Euphrasia.

Our reporter, on calling, found Mr. and Mrs. McCollum in very good spirits, apparently enjoying the evening of their lives in happiness and contentment. We tender them the hearty congratulations of the community.—*Clarkburg Reflector.*

## EUPHRASIA COUNCIL.

The council met at the township hall, Rockway, on Friday, the 8th instant. All members present, the reeve in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Conn-Rouje—That the tender of T. C. Deale, editor of the Meaford Monitor, for the printing of 500 copies of minutes of council at 50¢ per page, with \$2.00 extra for advertising abstract statement of auditors report; also 200 copies of Voters Lists at 50¢ per page, and \$1.00 for advertising Voters' Lists, be accepted, said work to be paid for when examined and found correct by a committee of the council.—Carried.

Conn-Johnston—That the report of the committee re the treasurer's account stating no change from last year be adopted.—Carried.

Ellis-Bennie—That this council pay \$3.00 per day for man and team and \$1.50 per day for men to work on the roads for the current year, ten hours to constitute a day's work.—Carried.

Conn-Johnston—That the auditor's report be received and the reeve, Mr. Bennie and the clerk be a committee to finally audit the same, and also proofread the minutes before sending them for publication.—Carried.

The following accounts were ordered to be paid: J. W. Remie, for removing tree on 27 and 28 sideroad, 50¢; J. M. Davis for money paid J. Campion, \$1.25; J. M. Davis for one day statute labor charged \$1; J. M. Davis for commission work re Morwood debris, \$8.00; S. J. McKnight, salary as auditor, \$10.00; J. A. Loughheed, salary 95¢.

The council adjourned until the 8th day of March.

## A Short-Sighted Policy.

It is a short-sighted policy and an exceedingly expensive policy, for our people to buy Manitoba wheat flour, when we have the best flour in the world right here at home.

It is high time that we all realize that every dollar spent for Manitoba wheat flour means a dollar taken out of the pockets of the Ontario people and put into the pockets of the Manitoba farmers and millers. We, in Ontario, are much to blame for this. Our farmers raise too little wheat, and what little is raised is sold outside the province in either wheat or flour.

Then they turn around and buy Manitoba wheat flour. They sell at the wholesale price and buy at the retail price, which includes expensive freight charges from the Northwest. And the western farmers make all the profits.

How much better to grow Ontario wheat, sell Ontario wheat, buy Ontario flour, and keep all this money at home among our own people. It means, not only money saved, but it also means giving our wives and mothers and sisters better flour for their baking. It is a fact that a blend of Ontario wheat, with a little Manitoba wheat makes the best all-round flour that can be milled. In the open markets of the world—in Great Britain, in Europe, in the United States—the blended flours command the highest prices. Down in Nova Scotia, and in fact throughout the Maritime provinces, blended flours are properly appreciated and used in preference to all others.

Our farmers should get the idea out of their heads that "there is no money in Ontario wheat." There is a steady and increasing demand for prime Ontario wheat, and wheat nets an excellent profit. The demand regulates the supply. With more Ontario flour being used, more wheat will be grown. Our farmers will plant larger wheat fields, harvest larger crops, and make more money.

The whole Province will share in the benefits. On the prosperity of the farmer depends the prosperity of the nation. And the prosperous community is the one that is able to live within itself and sell to its neighbors its surplus, and to buy from them only that which they can supply to better advantage.
