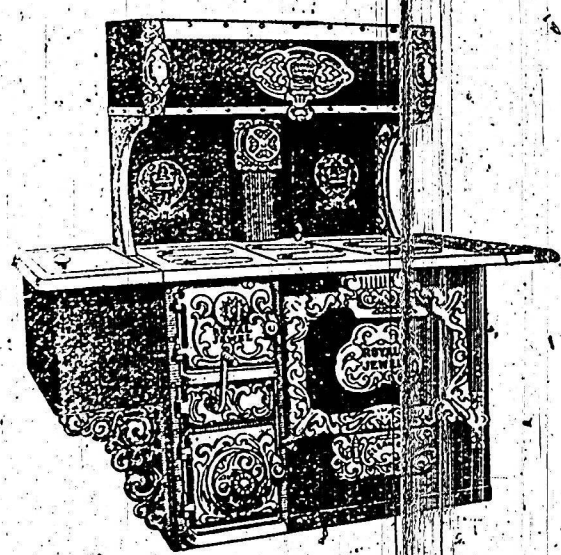

Golden Wedding.

On Saturday, February 9th, at their home in Thornbury, Mr. and Mrs. Neil McCollman, in the presence of about 20 of their most intimate friends, celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of their happy wedding day. The happy old couple were showered with congratulations and presented with a number of gold and silver articles in the form of tableware and jewelry, besides a little box of gold coins, which came by express from Syracuse, a present from two of their children who reside in that city. The afternoon and evening were most enjoyably spent and the festive occasion most fittingly celebrated. Mr. and Mrs. McCollman are both seventy-two years of age, there being only five days difference in their ages. Mr. McCollman was born in the Island of Iona, Argyllshire, Scotland, and moved in this country in the year 1845, settling first in Wellington County. In 1846 he came to Collingwood township, and with the exception of a couple of years in Halton County, has lived in this township since, successfully working the property known as lot 17, con. 51, on the 10th line for 23 years and living for 14 years in Thornbury.

Forty of his fifty years of married life were spent in public service as councillor, reeve and county councillor, besides a term in the provincial house at Toronto, as member for East Grey. Mr. McCollman was in 1856 married to Miss Martha Green, of the township of Vaughn, York County, at the pretty little village of Bolton, in York County, by the Rev. Mr. Laezy, then the pastor of the Primitive Methodist Church of that place. Ten children resulted from the happy union, five of which survive, viz: Mr. Neil, of Alberta; Mr. Peter A. and Mrs. W. Whitfield, of Syracuse; Mr. David, of Dakota, who was fortunately able to be present; and Mrs. Phillip White, of the 3rd line, Enniskillen.

Our reporter, on calling, found Mr. and Mrs. McCollman in very good spirits, apparently enjoying the evening of their lives in happiness and contentment. We tender them the hearty congratulations of the community. —Clarksburg Reflector.

Davis for one day statute labor charged \$1; J. M. Davis for commission job re Morwood deeds, \$3.00; S. J. McKnight, salary as auditor, \$10.00; J. A. Longhead, salary as auditor, \$10.00. A Short-Sighted Policy.

It is a short-sighted policy and an exceedingly expensive policy, for our people to buy Manitoba wheat flours, when we have the best flour in the world right here at home. It is high time that we all realize that every dollar spent for Manitoba wheat flour means a dollar taken out of the pockets of the Ontario people and put into the pockets of the Manitoba farmers and millers. We, in Ontario, are much to blame for this. Our farmers raise too little wheat and what little is raised is sold outside the province in either wheat or flour. Then they turn around and buy Manitoba wheat flours. They get at the wholesale price and buy at the retail price, which includes expensive freight charges from the Northwest. And the western farmers make all the profits.

How much better to grow Ontario wheat, sell Ontario wheat, buy Ontario flour, and keep all this money at home among our own people. It means, not only money saved, but it also means giving our wives and mothers and sisters a better flour for their baking. It is a fact that a blend of Ontario wheat, with a little Manitoba wheat makes the best all-round flour that can be milled. In the open markets of the world—in Great Britain, in Europe, in the United States—the blended flours command the highest prices. Down in Nova Scotia, and in fact throughout the Maritime provinces, blended flours are properly appreciated and used in preference to all others.

Our farmers should get the idea out of their heads that "there is no money in Ontario wheat." There is a steady and increasing demand for prime Ontario wheat, and wheat nets an excellent profit. The demand regulates the supply. With more Ontario flour being used, more wheat will be grown. Our farmers will plant larger wheat fields, harvest larger crops, and make more money. The whole Province will share in the benefits. On the prosperity of the farmer depends the prosperity of the nation. And the prosperous community is the one that is able to live within itself and selling to its neighbors its surplus, and to buy from them only that which they can supply to better advantage.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST

ANY even numbered Section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta, excepting 2 and 23, not reserved, may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less. Entry must be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated. The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:— (1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years. (2) If the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother. (3) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicinity of his homestead, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention for application.
