HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therawith under one of the following plans:—

(1) At least six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three

years.

(2) It the father (or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land outers i for, the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

(8) If the settler has his permanent residence upon farming land owned by him in the vicin of his homestead the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by residence upon the said land. Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent.


