**SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTHWEST
PROSPECTS AND REGULATIONS.**

1. The Northwest Section of Dominion
Lands in Manitoba, Saskatchewan and
Alberta, excepting 8 and 20, not reserved,
is being offered by public sale in the
whole of a family or any male over 18 years
of age, or of one-quarter section of 18
acres, more or less.

2. Entry may be made personally at the local
land office for the district in which the land is
situated.

3. The homestead is required to perform the
following conditions: (a) to reside upon one of
the following plots: (1) the residence upon and
cultivation of the land in each year for three
years; (2) to build a house of not less than
1000 square feet; (3) to plant and cultivate
the land in each year for three years; (4) if the father (or mother, if the father is
deceased) of the homestead resides upon a
plot of land, the homestead is required to
satisfy the requirements as to residence may be
satisfied by such person residing with the father or
mother.

4. If the settler has his permanent residence
upon farming land owned by him in the vicin-
ity of the land, the requirements as to resi-
dence may be satisfied by residence upon the
land.

5. A notice of intention to apply for a
homestead must be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at
Ottawa, or to the Minister of the Interior,
N.W.T., within the time specified in the
advertisement.

6. The homestead will be paid for by the
Government.
